then we beat it for supper. "The cats could not be any better, no matter where you could go. Have picked up a couple of pounds already in spite of a couple of shots in the arm. It did not make me sick at all. But you had ought to see some of the boys. They dropped off before they got it and some after they were shot. I was talking to Billie Leab, a guard that worked at the pen. He is here, too, and also saw Ralph Coffin, the man that used to work for Ben Ling. Have seen several men I know. One hasn't time to get lonesome in a place like this. Do not go to any brother sending papers for we have more news here than any ten fellow could read in a thousand years. Papers from all over the west of the Rockies.

"I have a sweater and the whole outfit. I had enough blankets with-out mine. Thank I will send it for, for we are in quarantine for two weeks. It is just in my way here.

"Took out \$10,000 insurance and the policy will be sent to you. It may not come right away because it takes some time to get things straight where there are so many men. I will also send you \$15 a month. The rest I keep.

"Tell Marie and Doc hello. I never felt better in my life. Tell everyone else hello for me. Tell Fred she's the only life for me, that our treatment could not be any better. We stopped in Portland just long enough to eat and arrived in camp at 4:30 Friday evening, all in down and out. I have got a swell job for tomorrow waiting on table. Take turns about in alphabetical order, and they have come to the L's so I am on K. F.—they call it kitchen police."

COUNTY PUPILS MAKE RECORDS

Aggregate Stamp Sales Up to May 1 Is \$17,426, Superintendent Reports

County School Superintendent W. M. Smith reports that up to May 1 boys and girls in the schools of Marion county had sold and purchased war thrift and savings stamps aggregating \$17,426. The figure does not include the sales made by the school children of Salem. Over 1500 boys and girls of the county have enrolled in industrial club work.

"The teachers and pupils of the Marion county schools deserve great credit for their splendid work in the various war activities which have been carried on through the schools," said Mr. Smith yesterday. "The teachers have organized these campaigns and they have been supported loyally by the pupils and patrons. The schools render a valuable service in both the campaigns for the conservation of the food supply. The boys and girls have taken a leading part in the sale of thrift and war savings stamps, having purchased or sold up to May 1, \$17,426. These figures do not include the Salem schools.

"Many of the schools have organized Junior Red Cross auxiliaries, and these are actively engaged in making many articles needed by the boys at the front as well as garments for the refugees.

"Over fifteen hundred boys and girls have enrolled in the industrial club work. Most of these have taken as their slogan, 'Produce, Save and Give to Win the War.' Two hundred fifty are raising pigs, others are raising sheep, poultry, Belgian hares, etc. Garden work is popular at this time of the year. This year will see more potatoes, corn, cabbage, etc., raised by boys and girls than ever before.

"Thus the schools are 'doing their bit' in making the world free for democracy."

SHIPPING BOARD WILL ASK MONEY

Huge Appropriation for Merchant Ship Construction Needed for Year

WASHINGTON, May 7.—An enormous appropriation for merchant ship construction will be asked of the house appropriation committee tomorrow by Chairman Hurley of the shipping board, in presenting estimates for the fiscal year beginning July 1. Until congress is informed of the board's plans, Mr. Hurley declined to indicate their extent or exact amount involved.

With all shipyards in operation, it is estimated that more than 10,000,000 tons of shipping can be produced during the year. On this basis Mr. Hurley's budget for the new year probably will run close to \$2,500,000,000, allowing for new concrete yards to be built and concrete construction not contemplated in the original plans of the board.

Extensions now being made in steel plants will allow an increase in the shipbuilding program, of which it is expected full advantages will be taken consistent with the needs of other government departments.

FOREIGN SHIP "WET" SPOT.

BREMERTON, Wash., April 20.—

What is believed to be the only "wet" spot within the limits of any navy yard in the country is at the Puget Sound naval station here. It is a foreign warship, of a nation that permits its men-of-war to have their "tot-o'-grog" regularly, and despite the orders of Secretary Daniels which prohibit liquor on naval property, to say nothing of the state of Washington's "dry" law, a bugle call summons the foreign sailors at certain periods each day to "splice the main-brace." The warship, being foreign territory, naturally is not governed by domestic laws of the United States.
