Voters May Swear Into New Party Election Day

Elks Make Plans to Celebrate Flag Day With Exercises on June 14

Word has gone out to all the Elk lodges throughout the United States that Flag day—June 14—should be commemorated with more patriotic zeal than ever before. Carrying out this suggestion the Salem lodge of Elks at its meeting last night appointed a committee with Louis Lachmund as chairman, to formulate plans for the observance of the day with appropriate ceremonies.

While no definite program has been outlined, the tentative plan is to have the exercises in Willson avenue, the same as last year when the Elk lodge through its representative, Mr. Lachmund, presented the city with the beautiful flag and the flagpole, which now adorns this popular park.

There will be music, the best obtainable, and one of Oregon's most prominent speakers will deliver an address, but the special feature for the occasion has not been fully worked out. However, it is needless to say that this patriotic order will have an extraordinary program this year, in celebrating the birthday of "Old Glory."

that they know their national flag when they see it, yet many are unfamiliar with its origin and history. The "Star Spangled Banner" became the national flag of the United States of America on June 14, 1777, when the continental congress, assembled in Philadelphia, adopted it as the nation's official emblem. The first national flag was made by Betsy Ross. The design of the American flag is said to have been suggested by George Washington's coat of arms—three stars and three stripes. The thirteen stars and thirteen stripes represented the thirteen original colonies. On the admission of a new state into the Union one star is added to the union of the flag; and such addition takes effect on July 4 next succeeding such admission.

Flag day has been an annual event with the Elks for a number of years, and this year it will have a tender significance because of the fact that about seventy-five of its members

have joined the colors and many are now in France. On June 14 the Elks will commemorate the birth of "Old Glory" and soldiers and citizens will be asked to participate. They will recall the strange, eventful history of its rise and progress, and rehearse the wondrous tale of its trials and its triumphs in peace as well as in war.
