Information Given on Professional Training

For the enlightenment of Senator Reed Smoot of Utah, F. C. Dillard, project engineer of the Talent irrigation district yesterday telegraphed the office of State Engineer Lewis to send Mr. Smoot all available data bearing on the Chamberlain bill providing government guarantee of interest payments on irrigation district bonds that have been approved by the government. Mr. Dillard has been informed that when the bill came up for hearing it was deferred to allow Mr. Smoot to make further study of the question. Dillard asks that the state engineer and officials of the Oregon irrigation congress send Senator Smoot information on the subject.

Check Clerk Protested by Service Commission

Joining with the public service commissions of Washington and Idaho the Oregon service commission will enter a protest before the interstate commerce commission relative to application that has been made by railroads of the northwest for an order requiring consignors or consignees of freight shipments to pay the expenses of a checking clerk.

As set forth in the application the purpose of the clerk would be to guarantee clean bills of lading and it is proposed that he be paid at the rate of \$2 for each car loaded, payment to be arranged between the consignor and the consignee.

Shippers are taking the position that this charge should be included in the freight rate.

PROPERTL LOSS FROM PLOTTING OF I. W. W. HUGE

Sabotage Practised in California
Hop Fields and Orchards Years Ago

BOYCOTT NOT JOKE

Stickers Used to Aid Fight for
Freedom of Ford and Suhr
Then in Jail

CHICAGO, May 21.—Inside history of the ruin wrought by the I. W. W. in the hopfields and fruit orchards of California by the practice of sabotage several years ago in an effort to obtain the release from prison of Richard Ford and Herman Suhr, members of the organization convicted on a charge of murder and sentenced to life imprisonment, was revealed at the trial of 442 I. W. W. leaders.

The government attorneys read a number of letters written by Charles L. Lambert of Sacramento, Cal., who was secretary of the hop pickers' defense committee in 1914, and later elected a member of the general executive board of the I. W. W. He was one of the leaders who directed the unsuccessful fight conducted by the organization in California in the hope that the governor might be influenced to pardon Ford and Suhr from prison.

\$10,000,000 Lost Annually.
According to Lambert, the I. W. W. campaign of sabotage resulted in the destruction of property valued at \$10,000,000 annually for several years.

In a bulletin signed by Lambert, the statement is made that the hop crop of California was 24,000 bales short of 1915, despite the fact that in that year the crop gave the heaviest yield on record. "Bosses say the boycott was a joke," wrote Lambert. "This joke will be repeated next year on a larger scale." The bulletin relates how the machinery of Durst brothers was wrecked, which caused them to lose one-third of their crop. "If we can do this much with poor discipline and organization we can do more next year," continued the writer. "This fight on the hop industry will be continued until Ford and Suhr are free."

Lambert Gives Orders.

In another bulletin Lambert tells of ordering 40,000 I. W. W. stickers for use in the fight. There were three styles of stickers, which bore these inscriptions:

"As long as Ford and Suhr are in the pen, don't stick copper/nails in fruit trees or grape vines; it hurts them."

"As long as Ford and Suhr are in the pen, beware of California canned goods."

"Ford and Suhr must be free; therefore a boycott has been declared on all hopfields, orchards and all ranching."

In a letter written to George Childs, treasurer of the Joe Hill Defense fund, Lambert on August 4, 1915, said:

"There is so little justice towards our class that we will have to change our tactics and in the future when one of our class is murdered in the interest of capitalism, two of theirs

should be murdered in the interest of labor and then the authorities will have more respect for us. We will have to use more direct action."

"Only Hope" in Sabotage.
Lambert in another letter expressed the opinion that more could be gained by sabotage in one week than in a generation by the "imperial valley route."

The coast cats practice sabotage and the eastern cats talk about it." Lambert wrote in another letter from Chicago in quoting an I. W. W. named Klein.

Lambert declared "our only hope lies in sabotage and direct action" in a letter addressed to Dick Highfield, at Oatman, Ariz.

A 1916 bulletin, Lambert told how I. W. W. members had overturned big gold dredges owned by the Natomas Gold Mining company and added it would cost \$75,000 to put it right again. In another bulletin the I. W. W. leader said California had paid a big price for the railroading of Ford and Suhr and by the time the organization got through paying off, the state would look "like a dirty white chip in a stack of blues." He referred to a riot in the hopfields near Wheatland and remarked he did not understand how the boys got away without leaving some in the hospital. "The newspapers are trying to make the public believe this is the work of German spies," wrote Lambert in describing the destruction of property by the I. W. W., but they will know what it is before we get through with them."

Fire Set By I. W. W.

In a letter written to G. J. Bourge, another defendant in the present trial, Lambert told of property in California valued at \$2,000,000 being destroyed by fire. He concludes this letter by telling of the killing of Sheriff Meadows of Imperial Valley. "They finally got our old friend Sheriff Meadows of Imperial Valley," wrote Lambert. "This rat has dodged everything successfully for the last five years from poison to bullets, but finally he fell and died after four hours of terrible agony from the poisoning of some kind. This is the skunk who used to sell the rebels, men and women, to the Mexican government and take them over the line and shoot them. He lived five years too long."

Lambert in a letter written to Richard Ford, who was in prison in June, 1915, said:

"Big Bill (Haywood) was up before the industrial relations committee in the east lately and he handed them a package they will not forget in a hurry. The chairman of the committee is sure a dandy, too. He is doing more to bring about a state of unrest among the workers than all the soapboxers and other reformers could do in 20 years."

Information to Be Sent United States Senator

With the object of pointing out to women the institutions in this state in which they may receive training for occupations other than teaching, the woman's committee of the Oregon division of the council of national defense has published a leaflet for distribution in the schools and other convenient places. This also contains information as to government positions, employment agencies for women, night schools, Red Cross service and food conservation. 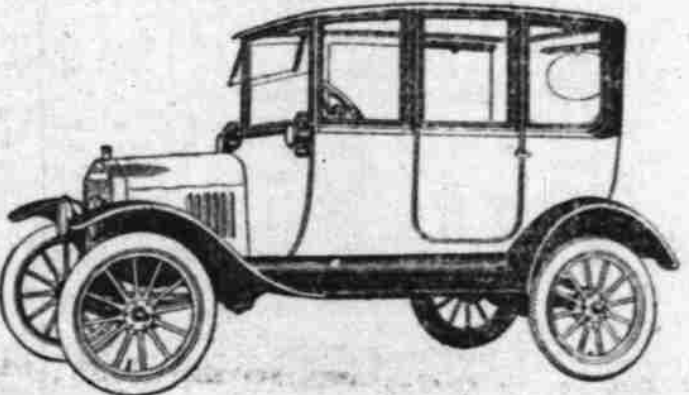
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
