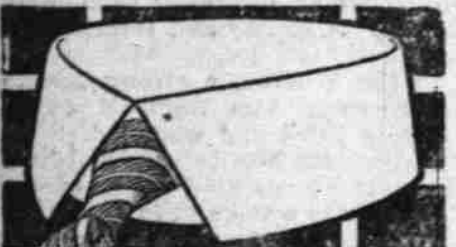

TWINS IN SAME POSITIONS.

STOCKHOLM, March 20.—An unusual case of twin brothers who have followed the same career and reached the same position in it is presented by two of Sweden's naval officers. Vice Admiral Gustaf Dyrssen and Vice Admiral Wilhelm Dyrssen, who have just celebrated their sixtieth birthday. Both became sub-lieutenants in the fleet in 1877.

Gustaf entered English service in 1881 and took part in the expedition to Egypt. He distinguished himself by his courage and was decorated with the English medal for bravery at sea, of which he is the only Swedish possessor. Returning to Sweden, he was for a few years head of Sweden's naval academy and became vice admiral last year.

Wilhelm Dyrssen participated in the "Vanadis" expedition around the world in 1883-84. He is an expert in the artillery branch of the service.

Both brothers are authors of standard works on naval warfare.

ENGLISH TAKEN PRISONERS.
BERLIN, May 27.—The German official statement relative to events on the battle front Sunday, issued by the war office today, reads:

"English prisoners were captured in a successful raid southeast of Meuse. The artillery activity did not revive on the battle front until afternoon. The enemy artillery was especially active in the Kemmel region, on the northern banks of the Lys, between Arras and Albert and on the western bank of the Aisne.

"Reconnoitering activity continued to be lively."

The text of the statement reads: "The battle continued throughout the day with extreme violence on a front of more than forty kilometers from the region of Vauxlaillon to the outskirts of Brimont. Masses of the enemy attacked our troops in the first line and pushed ahead without regard for their losses into the valley of the Aisne. Certain of their elements reached the end of the day the region of Pont Aven."

"The French and British troops cooperated magnificently, retired methodically and in perfect liaison making the enemy pay dearly for his first successes, which were inevitable and assured that foot by foot resistance would prove efficacious."

"The activity of the opposing artillery was maintained on both banks of the Meuse, in the region of St. Mihiel and on the Lorraine front."

UNCANNY SILENCE NO LONGER
ON THE FRENCH FRONT IN FRANCE, May 27.—The uncanny silence along the entire French battle front in the last few days was merely a prelude to a most violent attack today by the Germans along an extended front stretching from Pinon almost to Rheims. While there are no specific indications, it is most probable that the entire armies of General Von Boehm and General Franz von Below, under the supreme control of the imperial crown prince, have been thrown into the engagement.

ARREST ENEMY ALIEN.
HOQUAM, Wash., May 27.—Federal department of justice agents in this district today arrested Otto Michaelis, a German enemy alien, in connection with the fire which destroyed the Northwestern Lumber company's plant here Wednesday last. He is being held in jail for further investigation.

SALVATION ARMY GETS QUOTA
NEW YORK, May 27.—The Salvation Army's campaign for war fund of \$1,000,000 has exceeded its quota with a total of \$2,257,334, according to a statement made here tonight by Commander Evangeline Booth.

RIFLES PUT OUT IN SHORT TIME

American Factories Equipping Two Divisions With Lee-Enfields Each Week

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 27.—American factories are now producing Lee-Enfield rifles at the rate of 9000 a day—enough to equip two army divisions weekly—according to Representative John Q. Tilson of Connecticut, a member of the house military affairs committee, who addressed the Hardware Manufacturers' association for war service here today.

The speaker said he knew of the completion of one order for 10,000 sawed-off shotguns of the buckshot shooting model which General Pershing was quoted as endorsing as being especially well adapted for modern trench warfare.

He said these guns now are being used by American fighting men.

OFFICIAL SUMMARY OF WAR SITUATION

Germany's great offensive on the western front has been resumed.

With only brief artillery preparation, two blows have been struck by the Teuton armies, which have been reorganized since disastrous losses were inflicted on them by the French and British during the Picardy and Flanders battles in March and April.

One attack was on the line from Voormezele to Loere, south west of Ypres; the other on a thirty-five-mile front from Pinon, north of Sissons to Rheims. This is known as the Aisne sector.

In Flanders the Germans have gained virtually nothing, but further south the Berlin official statement claims that the German crown prince's troops have carried the whole ridge on the Chemin-des-Dames and now are fighting on the Aisne river.

The attack in Flanders is against positions taken by the French May 20, when they recaptured Bruosse and Loere and strengthened their line on each side of Hill 44, which they had re-taken a few days before.

On the Aisne front the present battle recalls the fearful fighting of last summer along the Chemin-des-Dames, where for weeks the German crown prince hurled his men against the French positions only to see them crushed and beaten. Last year 75 divisions were engaged in the German attacks along this line.

Th attack here is really in the nature of a line straightening operation. It is being launched from Laon as a center and is aimed at the elbow in the line formed during the fighting in Picardy in March and April. Here, however, the Germans must face permanent work which has been occupied by the French for long periods and which can be defended easily.

Evidence that the allied supreme command was forewarned of the attack may be found in the fact that the British troops are fighting there. It had been believed that the British forces did not hold positions much south of the Somme, east of Amiens.

The German crown prince is in command in this sector and this may indicate a serious effort to break the allied line. Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, is the nominal commander in Artois and Picardy and the German crown prince, for dynastic reasons, will strive to outdo whatever success was attained by his colleague further north.

It is probable that the American troops are engaged in the fighting front. It is known that American troops are close behind the allied lines in Flanders, while some time ago it was reported that they were near Rheims.

The late official reports note severe fighting in the Apremont forest, where Americans are known to be holding positions. The reports say that the Germans were repulsed.

It is officially reported from Washington that American positions in the Picardy sector near Cantigny and Montdidier, have been subjected to attacks and that at places the Germans penetrated them. The enemy, however, was driven out later.

Almost coincident with the new German assault, the Italian line launched a blow at the Austrian lines in the mountain region to the northwest of Lake Garda. According to reports, they have carried Monticello pass, the village of Presena, Monte Zigelon and the mountain spur to the east. Before them lie parallel streams leading down into the Lagarina valley.

And, if they successfully carry out their attack there, it is possible for them to outflank the entire Austrian position in the north of Italy.

The long range bombardment of Paris has been resumed.

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ESTABLISH NEW POSTAL ZONES

Regulations Governing Periodicals Published by Post Office Department

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Regulations establishing the zone system of postal rates for newspapers and magazines have been issued by the postmaster general. That part of periodicals devoted to reading matter after July 1 is assigned a rate of 1 1/2 cents a pound for the first year and 1 1/2 cents thereafter. The portion of periodicals devoted to advertising matter is assigned zoned rates running from 1 1/2 cents to 3 1/2 cents, the first year. In 1919 the regulations provide a scale running to 5 1/2 cents, while in the third year the charge is raised to 7 1/2 cents in the furthest zone, and in the fourth it is raised to 10 cents. Intermediate zones take a rate proportionate increasing.

To make effective the discrimination between the weight of reading matter and advertising, the regulations provide that all publishers shall file a copy of every publication marking to show the percentage of each. Publishers are also required to sep-

arate publications in mailing in accordance with the zones to which copies are destined.

The separation can be avoided only by the filing of circulation estimates showing the percentage of publications going into the different zones.

Miss Bessie Hattan is the new county treasurer of Columbia county, Washington, the first woman of her section to hold county office.

Women have been made eligible to positions as federal deputy shipping commissioners. Appointees will have the right to board ships in their capacity as federal officers and will be called upon to deal with questions arising between the masters of vessels and seamen.

Camp Fire girls have started a movement to "adopt" Red Cross nurses in Europe in the same way that the soldiers have been "adopted." The nurses, many of them stationed near the firing line and remote from cities and towns, will be supplied with little necessities, such as handkerchiefs, towels, toilet articles, dainties for convalescents or whatever they need.

When Mrs. Bridget Quinn, of Conifer, Pa., heard that the American munition factories needed human hair for making "some kind of rope" she promptly wrote to the war department at Washington offering to give her hair and that of her daughter to the government as a patriotic sacrifice.



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
