NEW YORK, May 27.—Stocks were tossed to and fro today, their confusing course keeping pace with the many conflicting developments of the session.

The net result left an imposing array of losses, these ranging from two to ten points among industrials, equipments, shippings and specialties and one to three points among rails.

Transportation stocks were clearly disposed to strengthen at the opening in consequence of the increased freight and passenger rates ordered by Director General McAdoo, but made only slight progress when it became known that President Wilson would submit his views on revenue legislation to congress. An additional deterrent was offered by the early war bill.

At no period until the final hour, when the full text of the president's message was available, did the market manifest more than moderate irregularity or the selling attain unusual proportions.

United States Steel recorded an extreme loss of three points, but in such mercurial issues as Midvale Steel, Baldwin Locomotive, Industrial Alcohol, Marine, preferred; Colorado Fuel and Atlantic Gulf, recessions extended from four to ten points. Steel \$25.000 shares.

Bonds sagged with stocks, liberty second four's at 94.50 and the 4 1/2's at 97.26, breaking into new low ground. Anglo-French 6s also fell 1 1/2 points. Total sales, par value, aggregated \$7,550,000.

CHICAGO, May 27.—Ideal conditions to make seed germinate and to promote growth brought about a material decline today in prices of corn. The finish was nervous 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 net lower, with June 1.35 1/2 and July 1.37 1/2 @ 1/2. Oats closed unchanged 1 1/2 c down. In provision the outcome varied from 2c off to an advance of 12c.

Auspicious weather seemed to govern the corn trade to the exclusion of all other factors. Knowledge that to some extent rains were interfering with field work seemed to be generally synchronized.

Some sympathy with the weakness of corn. Besides, for the first time in months, the visible supply total was in excess of last year's corresponding figures
