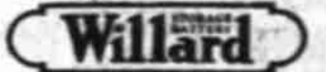
The Sub-Conscious Mind

TORPEDOES MAKE TOO MUCH NOISE

Public Service Commission May Put Quietus on Signal System of S. P.

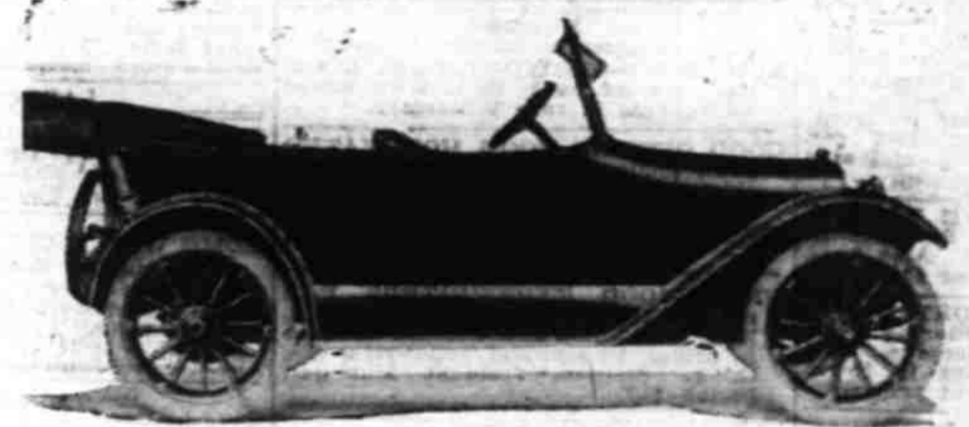
Torpedoes that are used as signals by the Southern Pacific company in Salem during the night may get a quietus from the public service commission. Complaints have been made about the disturbance caused by the exploding of torpedoes, are small, but productive of great noise. They are placed on the rails and exploded by the wheels of the trains or by being struck with a hammer. Some other practices of the company in Salem are being looked into. Attention of the commission has been called to the practice of the company's freight trains being backed along the tracks with no warning except the bell of the engine sometimes two or three blocks away. Complaint also is made that the lavatories of cars are dumped on the streets.
