partially wrecked—one of the warehouses. Details of the conflagration's extent or cause are meager as military authorities immediately took charge throwing a heavy guard of soldiers around the enclosure refuse to admit any but the fire fighting units. Officers of the quartermaster's department said early today that more than 15,000,000 yards of khaki cloth for army uniforms, valued at more than \$3,000,000, were destroyed. Fifteen thousand soldiers' service hats were also lost.

buying as its extreme decline, coming forward briskly at the close with other industrials and equipments of the class. Rains yielded irregularly at the outset, but steadied later under the lead of Reading and similar investment shares. Sales amounted to 210,000 shares. Apart from the decrease of almost \$44,000,000 in actual loans, the bank statement presented no features of especial interest. Bonds were heavy, the lower records by liberty issues conducting to that end. New minimums were 93.70 for the first 4s, 93.53 for the second 4s, and 96.30 for the 4 1/2s. Total sales, par value, aggregated \$2,500,000. U. S. 2s and 4s, old issues, gained half per cent on call during the week.

Corn Prices Are Higher When Day Reaches Close

CHICAGO, June 1.—Week-end evening up by shorts made prices of corn today average decidedly higher. The finish though was unsettled, ranging from 1 1/4c net decline to a like advance, with June \$1.30 1/2 and July \$1.33 3/4 to \$1.34. Oats gained 1/4 to 3/8c, and provisions 25 to 75 cents. It was evident almost from the outset that the corn market temporarily had been put in an over-sold condition. After a slight dip at the opening, prices responded quickly to buying, which seemed to be nearly altogether of a profit-taking sort. Bulls, however, professed to be encouraged by signs that congestion in the east was clearing up and that demand there might again become a factor. A little export business helped to lift the value of oats. Besides, temperatures in Canada were again unfavorable for crop progress. Provisions ascended with grain and hogs. Receipts of hogs were less plentiful than had been looked for.
