### GRANGE SESSION COMES TO CLOSE

Adjournment at 2:30 O'clock Yesterday Morning—Resolutions Passed

After one of the stormiest sessions in its history the Oregon State Grange convention came to close at 2:30 o'clock yesterday morning. Notwithstanding that on the floor of the convention particularly during the first two days, two strong factions were hammering at each other bitterly at times, the session became closely enough united during the last two days to get together on pairs. They covered the trip in four urgent as legislation.

The last hours of the session were taken up mainly with action on committee reports. Important among resolutions considered was one recommending passage of the McNary bill directed against profiteering and instructing the State Grange to urge congress to extend President Wilson authority to curb profiteering. The resolution further would have the government take over such industries as are necessary for conducting the war.

**Stands With Withycombe.**  
The Grange stands with Governor Withycombe in his policy relative to the Oregon-California land grant, having adopted a report of the forestry committee recommending that all of the grant lands be withheld from entry and sale and that all land in forest reserves suitable for agriculture be withheld until the soldiers return from the war so they may be given a preferential right in homesteading the lands.

Congress is urged to stop brewing beer during the war by the adoption of the resolution pointing out that thousands of freight cars and employees are used annually and enormous quantities of coal, grain and sugar used in the manufacture of beer.

Other resolutions acted upon in the report of the resolutions committee and adopted were:

That legislative committee urge the legislature to pass a law making it obligatory for land owners to destroy digger squirrels.

That the legislative committee con-

fer with the legislature relative to equipping farms ready for sale to returning soldiers.

Opposing bill providing for southern and eastern Oregon normal schools. The Grange expressed the opinion that now is not a proper time to urge establishment of normal schools.

That the Master of the State Grange, by legislative enactment, be made a regent of the University of Oregon and the State Normal school.

That a law for the eradication of the Canadian thistle be enforced.

The Illinois Women's Athletic club of Chicago is planning to build a million-dollar club house.

The St. Louis women's rifle squad has been organized by 100 society women and girls of that city.

Several of the prominent New York hotels have adopted the policy of setting apart an entire floor for the exclusive use of woman patrons.

June Houghton, the foremost woman rifle shot in the world, is teaching marksmanship and the art of self-defense to a number of New York society women.
