**GRANGE SESSION** COMES TO CLOSE Adjournment at 2:30 O'clock

olutions Passed After one of the stormiest sessions in its history the Oregon State Grange convention came to close at 2:30 o'clock yesterday morning. Notwithstanding that on the floor of the convention particularly duing the first two days, two strong factions were hammering at each other bitterly at times, the session became closely enough united during he last two days to get together on pairs. They covered the trip in four

irged as legislation. The last hours of the session were Extra Value of taken up mainly with action on committee reports. Important among resolutions considered was one recommending passage of the McNary bill directed against profiteering and instructing the State Grange to urge congress to extend President Wilson authority to curb profiteering. The resolution further would have the government take over such industries. as are necessary for conducting the war.

Stands With Withycombe. The Grange stands with Governor Withycombe in his policy relative to Oregon-California land grant, having adopted a report of the forestry committee recommending that all of the grant lands be withheld from entry and sale and that all land forest reserves suitable for agricultres be withheld until the soldiers return from the war so they may be given a preferential right in homesteading the lands.

Congress is urged to stop brewing beer during the war by the adoption of the resolution pointing out that thousands of freight cars and employes are used annually and enormous quantities of coal, grain and sugar used in the manufacture of
