A. A. Mickel, Salem representative of the Southern Pacific company, has advised from R. H. Ashton, regional director at Chicago under the federal railroad administration, that all freight sheds of the larger stations

of Oregon, Washington and Idaho will be closed at 4 instead of 5 o'clock each day to receipt or delivery of freight, except on Saturday when the closing hour will be 1 o'clock. The reason for the order, presumably, is the shortage of labor and the necessity of too long hours for employes under the former closing schedule.

SKYGAZING POPULAR YESTERDAY

Downtown Streets Crowded With People Watching for Eclipse—Cloudy Sky Fails to Hinder Salem's View

Undoubtedly the chickens did make a mistake, but the crowds of people down town yesterday afternoon certainly knew the difference between bed time and an eclipse of the sun. Those who were not armed in advance with smoked glass, photographic plates, developed kodak films or dark glasses found themselves completely out of the swim.

"This occurs every year doesn't it?" a newcomer inquired of his neighbor.

"Is it going to rain?" a child asked her mother.

"Let's go home to supper," said another.

Everyone had a remark to pass on. Most of them disagreed on the time the phenomenon was due to take place. About twenty minutes to 3 a dark shadow began to edge slowly across the sun and skygazing became the fad. Storekeepers forgot their shops to run out into the street and see just how much was covered. Clerks in the court house lined up on the steps, shoppers stopped on street corners and business was virtually at a standstill. The center

of attraction was the corner of State and Liberty where the owner of a large telescope was doing business at "twenty-five cents a look." Many automobile parties drove around the city streets, the people in the cars all watching the sky, earthly things forgotten for the time. One place a group of youngsters spied their school teacher sitting on the cement curb raptly gazing at the sun.

One of the amusing sights was a woman, who had in place of a smoked glass, a plate on which was the negative of an X-ray picture. She was looking at the sun as through bars, for the picture showed a set of ribs.

At 3:55 the eclipse was at its best and the sky took on a twilight appearance, much as though a heavy storm were about to break. Many stores turned on their electric lights until the shadow passed. Shortly before the 97 per cent view a beautiful circular rainbow could be seen a distance around the light spot. This is known as the marginal colors. The sky was cloudy during the eclipse but the view was not hindered

DECORATIONS FOR CLOTHING

NEW YORK, June 5.—The scarcity of clothing in Germany has resulted in an order that all municipalities negotiate with societies for the utilization of materials used for hall decorations, says the Berlin Tageblatt. The Imperial clothing board has been forced to deny the applications of communities for the delivery of clothing and linen for city children sent to the country, because of the scarcity of supplies. Worn footwear and old leather may be sold only to persons and boards designated by the Imperial board for shoe supply. The same holds good as to all finished goods in whole or in part of leather such as trunks and hat and helmet boxes, footballs, dice boxes, saddles, school knapsacks, harnesses, card cases.

KEPHART MAKES RECORD ON TRIP

Tool Box Not Opened on Run From San Luis Obispo to Marion, Ore.

One of the successful trips taken by auto from Southern California was taken by M. F. Kephart in his roadster accompanied by his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. F. Davis.

They traveled from San Luis Obispo to Marion, Oregon, covering 1190 miles without taking a tool out of and not spending a cent for repairs. They covered the trip in four and a half days. They made the trip up through the Sacramento valley to Redding and then followed the Pa-

cific highway. Mr. Kephart says the roads in good shape except from Redding to Dunsmuir which are in very bad shape on account of work being done on the main road which forces traffic to take the side roads which are not in good condition.

Crops in Southern California are in good shape and not costing a cent for the rain, but up through the Sacramento valley the crops are good. The trip was made on fifty-gallon gallons of gasoline and one and one-half gallons of oil, averaging seven and three-fourths miles per gallon and one hundred and ninety miles on a quart of oil.

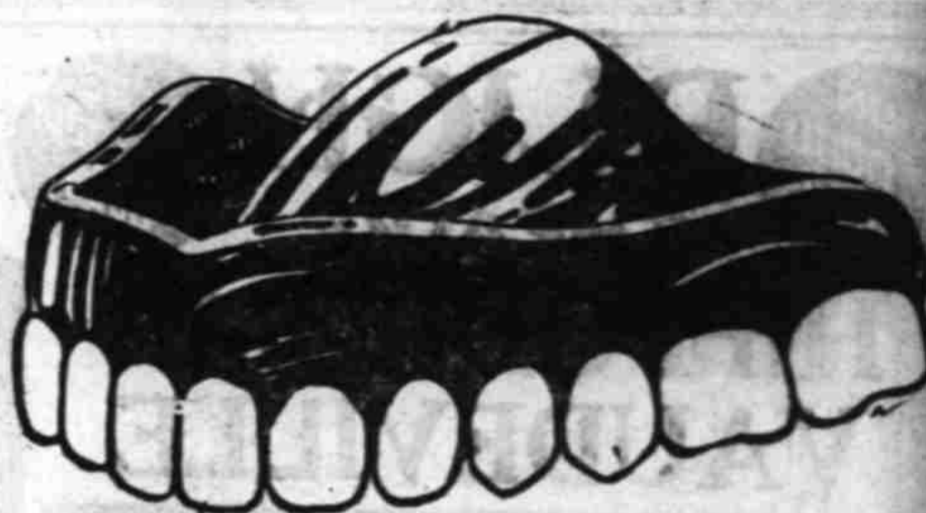
