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Attempts to Collect Profits Force Raise

CHICAGO, June 12.—Bears overreached themselves today selling corn. An unexpected return of cool weather made the selling look reasonable, but efforts to collect profits met with unusual difficulty and forced a sharp advance in prices. The market closed strong 2 to 2 1/2c net higher with July \$1.44 1/2 to \$1.45 and August \$1.46 1/2 to \$1.47 1/2. Oats gained 1/2 to 3/4c and provisions 7 to 55c.

Besides temperatures suddenly dropped back to normal, a liberal movement from rural sources had a further tendency to depress values. Upturns in oats were due to sympathy with the advance of corn. Exporters appeared to be out of the market. Provisions hardened owing chiefly to an advance in the value of hogs.
