For the purpose of opening bids and letting a contract for the construction of the Salem-Aurora stretch of the Pacific highway, the state highway commission will meet in Pocatello June 25. Bids will be received up to 11 o'clock. Construction is to be in two units, one of 7.35 miles and another of 10.65 miles. Bids will be received on all types and contractors will be allowed to secure Portland cement at prices fixed by the war industries board. This is at \$2 a barrel f. o. b. Oswego. No guarantee of workmanship, material or a maintenance bond will be required of contractors.
