JULY 3 LAST DATE TO FILE

Olcott Tells Rules Governing **Petitions and Arguments** for Bills.

From now until July 3 remains for filing completed initiative petitions with the secretary of state for the general election in November, the constitution making the time when this privilege expires four months before the election. It is required of the secretary of state that he have printed by August 7 all initiative or referendum measures with arguments for or against them, and between that date and September 10 he is required to mail a copy to each registered voter of the state whose postoffice addresses have been

furnished by county clerks.
In a statement yesterday Secretary Olcott gives the following requirements covering the filing of pe-

titions and arguments: "Only the person, committee or organization filing an initiative petition, and no others, may file arguments advocating such measure for publication in the measure pamphlet, provided such arguments are filed not later than the 115th day (July 13, 1918) before the general elec-

"Any person, committee or organization may file arguments for publication in the measures pamphlet opposing any initiative measure, if filed not later than the 105th day (July 23. 1918) before the general election.

"Any person, committee or organization may file arguments advocating or opposing any measure refer-red to the people by the legislative or by referendum petition as a gen-eral election. The same rules as to time apply upon such measures as upon laws proposed by initiative pe-

"In order to cover the cost of paper and printing, as provided by law, a deposit of \$75 based on the estimate of the State Printer, for each page of argument submitted, in either case, must accompany the same when fil-ed with the Secretary of State for publication in the pamphlet."
