FRIENDS WILL END NEWBERG SESSION TODAY

Temperance, Literature and Educational Departments Give Reports.

COLLEGE SHOWS GROWTH

Denomination Gives Members to War Service for Country.

NEWBERG, Or., June 17.—(Special to The Statesman.)—The twenty-sixth annual session of Oregon Yearly Meeting of Friends will probably end late tomorrow. The unusual amount of business has been transacted with dispatch and thus far in much harmony.

The departments of temperance, good literature and education presented their reports today. The report on education was of especial interest.

Tracing the growth of the German idea of adding territory to territory by means of blood and iron from the time of Frederick the Great, Mr. Burns brought it down to present-day methods, U-boat sinkings, spy plots and modern means of warfare.

Three messages were presented to great crowds Sunday. In the morning meeting Mr. Tebbetts preached. In the afternoon the sermon was delivered by Fred E. Carter, pastor of the church at Newberg, while in the evening Carl Miller, the new pastor at Springbrook, gave the missionary address of the yearly meeting.

Saturday evening was the annual Christian Endeavor rally, the annual reports also being presented. Chester A. Hadley of Rosedale is the new head of this department, and plans of considerable magnitude are on foot for the coming year, including a summer conference one of the Tillamook beaches. An offering of \$100 was taken for this work.

There were three principal features to the anniversary celebration, the church at Newberg, the first meeting over forty years ago, up to the present at the organization of this first meeting. They were Jesse Hobson of Portland and Anna Blair of Newberg, children of William Hobson, the father of Oregon Quakerism, and Lillian Robertson. A number of others were present at the first evangelistic meeting ever held in the Chahalem valley, and seventy pere present who attended the opening of the yearly meeting twenty-five years ago.

Messages of greeting were read from John Henry Douglas, one of the early pioneer evangelists in this section, from the former clerks of the yearly meeting, Dr. Thomas Newlin, first president of Pacific college, later of Whittier and of Guilford colleges, and now in charge of army Y. M. C. A. work in Camp Jackson; H. Edwin McGrew, second president of Pacific college, later pastor of Whittier meeting, the largest Friends church in the world and now president elect of Penn college; Julius C. Hodson, now of Indiana; and also from Walter C. Woodward, a graduate of Pacific college, a teacher in this college, and now general secretary of the Five Years Meeting and editor of the American Friend.

POLK COUNTY HELPS GUARD

Taxpayers Authorize Court to Buy Uniforms for Home Defenders.

DALLAS, June 15.—(Special to The Statesman.)—At a meeting of the representative taxpayers of the county held with the county court this week that body was authorized to spend at least \$2500 in furnishing uniforms for the two companies of home guards in Polk county. One of the companies is located at Buena Vista and has a membership of about sixty-five men and the other with an enrollment of 100 men is located in Dallas. The home guard band, composed of musicians from all over the county, will also be furnished with uniforms. The band at present is drilling with the home guard organizations. The uniforms to be purchased will be of the regulation army pattern off khaki and will consist of a blouse, pants and hat. Shoes and shirts must be furnished by each individual member. The taxpayers also authorized the county court to help in a similar way the Polk county company of defense for the purchase of stationery, stamps and other necessities.

JULY 3 LAST DATE TO FILE

Olcott Tells Rules Governing Petitions and Arguments for Bills. From now until July 3 remains for filing completed initiative petitions with the secretary of state for the general election in November, the constitution making the time when this privilege expires four months before the election. It is required of the secretary of state that he have printed by August 7 all initiative or referendum measures with arguments for or against them, and between that date and September 10 he is required to mail a copy to each registered voter of the state whose postoffice addresses have been furnished by county clerks.

In a statement yesterday Secretary Olcott gives the following requirements covering the filing of petitions and arguments: "Only the person, committee or organization filing an initiative petition, and no others, may file arguments advocating such measure for publication in the measure pamphlet, provided such arguments are filed not later than the 15th day (July 13, 1918) before the general election.

"Any person, committee or organization may file arguments for publication in the measure pamphlet opposing any initiative measure, if filed not later than the 10th day (July 23, 1918) before the general election. "Any person, committee or organization may file arguments advocating or opposing any measure referred to the people by the legislative or by referendum petition as a general election. The same rules as to time apply upon such measures as upon laws proposed by initiative petition.

"In order to cover the cost of paper and printing, as provided by law, a deposit of \$75 based on the estimate of the State Printer, for each page of argument submitted, in either case, must accompany the same when filed with the Secretary of State for publication in the pamphlet."
