An opinion written yesterday by Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle holds that the county courts lose jurisdiction over feeble-minded persons after they have been received at the institution for feebleminded. The opinion holds that any county court may commit a feeble minded person to the institution, and then parole to relatives or guardians instead of actually sending the person to the institution, on guardian give a bond. ferred to the attorney general's office by Dr. J. N. Smith, superintendent of the institution for the feeble minded and arose from a case in Judge Tazwell's court in Portland.

Crop Conditions Are Not **Promising Around Medford**

Crop conditions are anything but promising in the Medford irrigation district, according to a letter received by State Engineer Lewis from Leonard Carpenter, president of that irrigation district. Mr. Carpenter says that the crops are dying in the fields and that grain will almost be a failure, though hay grown on the lands in the district will partially relieve the stock feed shortage. Alfalfa is said to be held at \$19 a ton in the field, a price considered almost prohibitive.
