Difficulty in Obtaining Licenses Leads to Sales

CHICAGO, June 20 .- Announcement that unlicensed persons could not take delivery of cash grain on future contracts and that no speculator could obtain a license led to heavy selling of corn and oats futures today ,and broke prices sharply.
