Crop Damage from Frost in East Affects Prices

CHICAGO, June 26.—Government
 advices showing crop damage from
 frost east of Chicago and from hot
 weather in the lower plains states
 had a good deal to do with advance
 market. Prices closed unsettled 1
 to 3/4 c net higher, with July \$1.46 1/4
 to 1.46 3/4 c, and August \$1.48 1/4 @ 1/4
 c. Oats gained 1/4 to 3/4 c and provisions
 12 to 25 cents.

Notes from a County Agri- cultural Agent in Oregon

R. A. Ward is agricultural agent
 for Crook and Deschutes counties,
 Oregon, and some notes from his
 May report are as follows:

The first meeting ever scheduled
 in Suplee, Crook county, Oregon, by
 an agricultural agent was held there
 on May 21. A large crowd was out,
 and the Suplee Improvement Club
 was formed. Two hundred quarts
 of poisoned grain and 25 ounces of
 Crook county strychnine were dis-
 tributed. Geo. Senecal was elected
 president and Melvin Weberg secre-
 tary. The club reports excellent re-
 sults in killing sage rats. A well-
 attended squirrel poison meeting was
 held in Paulina on May 20. Poison
 was mixed and distributed. The fol-
 lowing day a community poison meet-
 ing was held at the ranch of Hugh
 Lister, on Beaver creek, and 240
 quarts of poison mixed by the agent
 for demonstration purposes. Mr.
 Rannels, of Paulina, counted over 45
 dead rats after exposing a small
 batch. Other meetings held were at
 Bend, Tumalo, Terrebonne, and
 Grimes Chapel on Crooked river. For
 convenience of those not wishing to
 mix poison, the agent prepared 900
 quarts which were distributed at cost.
 Both supplies of Crook and Deschutes
 counties strychnine are about ex-
 hausted. The Allen Ridge Rabbit
 Club, under the direction of J. D.
 Hight, turned in a report of 23 rab-
 bits killed by the salt block method
 of four of the club members. It is his
 belief that many more were killed
 but not counted.
