Miss Eva Miller of Harrisburg has been visiting her sister, Miss Jessie Miller.

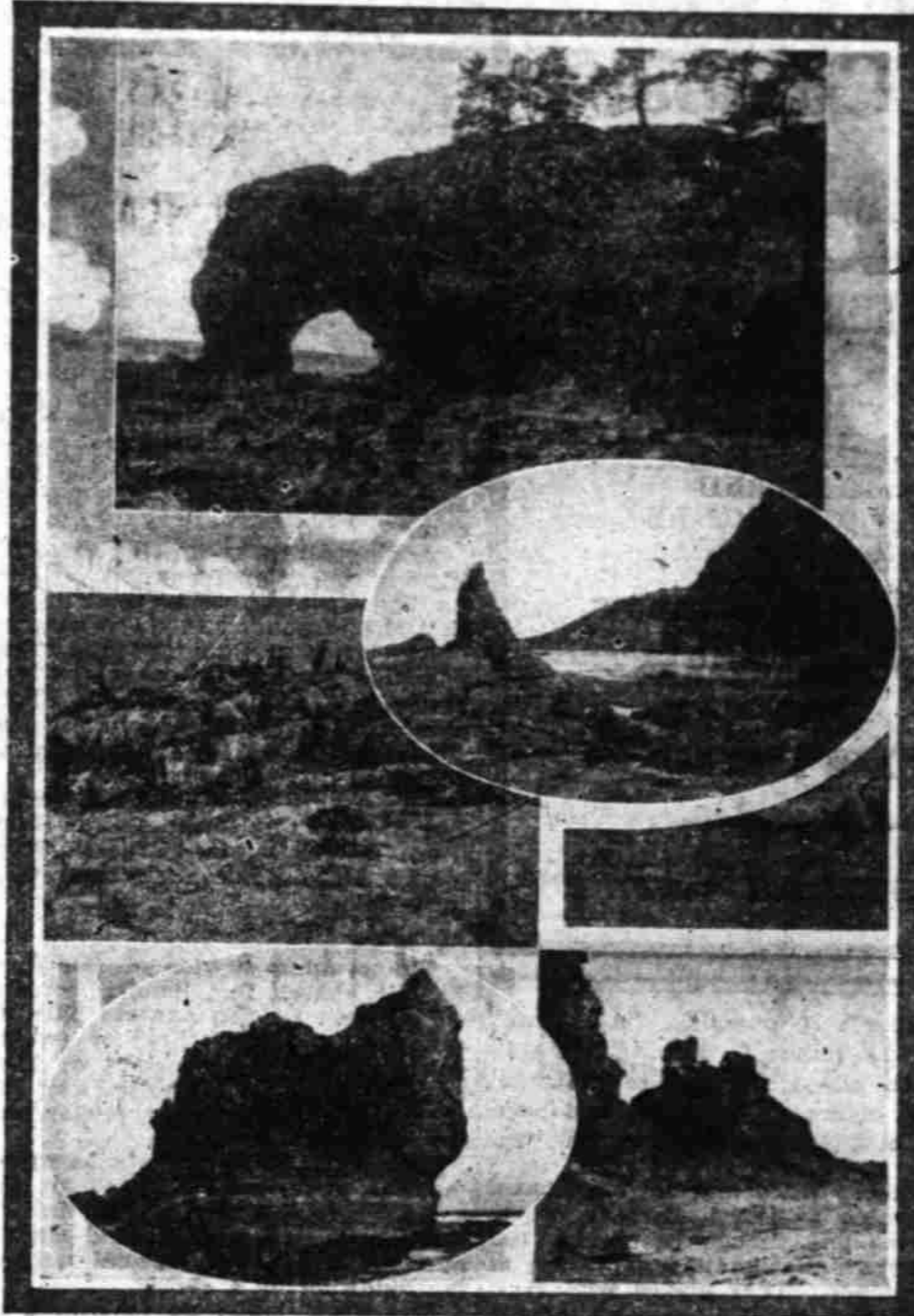
Miss Alta Jones has returned from Portland where she passed a week.
