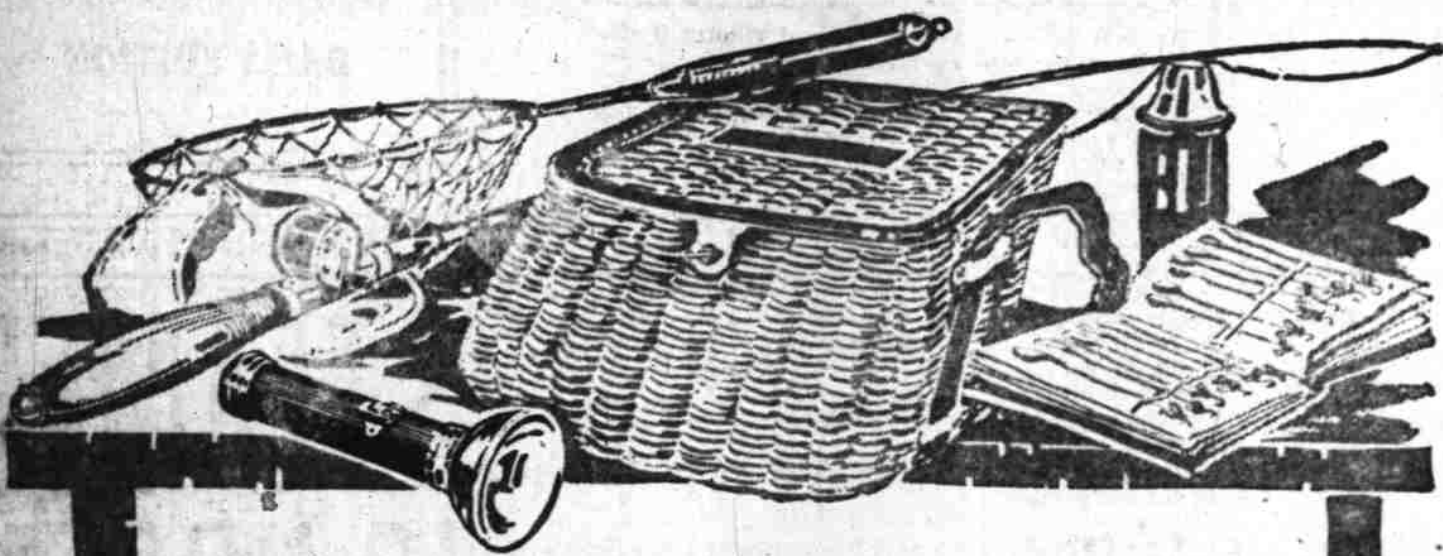

DALLAS, July 5.—(Special to The Statesman.)—Rev. D. A. MacKenzie, pastor of the Dallas Presbyterian church for the past several years, has given up church work in this city and will enter army Y. M. He understands English here and Dallas people will regret to see them leave. On account of the inability to secure a house in Vancouver the MacKenzie family will not accompany Mr. MacKenzie to his new field of service.

Beef Blood Too Strong As Diet for Aphids Pest

DALLAS, July 5.—(Special to The Statesman.)—U. S. Grant of this city has been experimenting during the past week with a new spray for aphids and has found out that it has had a wonderful effect on the pests, and also on his garden. Mr. Grant has an exceptionally fine garden and last week noticed that aphids were destroying his peas. He procured a quart of beef blood from one of the local meat markets and mixed this with ten gallons of warm water and used the mixture as a spray. The results were more than gratifying and the aphids were killed and the plants according to Mr. Grant, began to take on new life immediately. Several other local gardeners have since used the spray with success and highly recommend it to others bothered with aphids destroying gardens.

SHAFT PLANNED FOR OLD SITE

Dallas Citizens to Build Monument Where First Court House Stood

DALLAS, July 5.—(Special to The Statesman.)—At a meeting of the Dallas chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, plans were made for the erection of a suitable marker for the site of the first court house in Polk county. The monument has been donated by George L. Hawkins, and the engraving will be paid for by the local chapter.
 The shaft which will be of granite will be erected near the Skinner store in North Dallas. The first term of court held in Polk county convened in a log school house on the claim of Cary D. Embree, one of the first settlers, near Rickreall. The room being too small for the jury to deliberate, that body retired to the timber near the building to settle the cases. For a number of years afterwards court was held in various houses throughout the county and in 1850 the first court house was erected.
 When the town moved to the north bank of the Rickreall a new building was erected on the present county grounds but it was destroyed by fire in 1898 and the present fine stone edifice erected. It is planned to have the monument completed and ready for unveiling on November, which is the anniversary of the birth of President Polk after whom Polk county was named. An appropriate ceremony will be held at that time in which the school children and legal talent of the county will participate.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—An administration bill authorizing issuance of \$8,000,000,000 additional in liberty bonds and providing for additional \$1,500,000,000 for loans to the allies, recently passed by the house, was passed late today by the senate without amendment or a roll call. It now goes to President Wilson.

Dallas Ahead of Quota By Over Thousand Dollars

DALLAS, Or., July 5.—(Special to The Statesman.)—W. G. Vassall, chairman of the local war saving stamp drive, stated last night at a meeting of the Dallas Commercial club that this district had exceeded its quota in the drive by more than \$1000. This is exceeding good news to the committees that have been working hard during the past ten days on the sale of stamps and prizes are being showered on Mr. Vassall for his untiring efforts in making the sale a success. Or. A. E. Starbuck, chairman of the war saving stamp movement in Polk county, reports however, that the county will fall a little short of its quota but insists that committees keep at the work until the full amount has been reached.

Telephone Control Bill Awaiting Senate Action

WASHINGTON, July 5.—The joint resolution authorizing the president to take over and operate until the end of the war all telegraph, telephone, cable and radio systems in the United States, was passed tonight by the house. It now goes to the senate, but indications were that action on it there would be deferred until after the mid-summer recess, planned to begin the end of this week.
 The vote was 221 to 4. Those voting against the resolution were Fordney and McLaughlin, Michigan; Sterling, Illinois, and Woods, Iowa, all Republicans.
Action to Hold Over
 While the house was hastily adopting the resolution authorizing government operation during the war of all telegraph, telephone and cable systems, senate leaders tonight received word from President Wilson which they interpreted as indicating his willingness to have final enactment of the resolution postponed until after mid-summer vacation.
 Leaders in both houses tonight went ahead with plans for a recess late tomorrow night until August 12. It was said they would put through unless tomorrow the president insists upon immediate passage of the telegraph resolution by the senate. Majority Leader Kitchin gave notice in the house tonight that tomorrow, after disposition of the conference reports on the army and agricultural appropriation bills, he would offer a concurrent resolution for a recess until August 12.
 The telegraph resolution was adopted by the house tonight by a vote of 221 to 4, after a spirited debate in which Democratic leaders said the president had expressed a desire for its passage at once and some Republicans had charged that the authority proposed for the president would be used to further the interests of the Democratic party.
 To expedite passage of the resolution, the house previously had adopted by a viva voce vote rule limiting general debate to two hours. The resolution will be sent to the senate tomorrow with leaders there planning its reference to the interstate commerce commissions for study and probable hearing during the recess. Regardless of the recess plans, senate leaders said its adoption by next Monday, the date for which the strike of operators employed by the Western Union Telegraph company is called, is not possible.

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WAR SUMMARY

The British front east of Amiens on the east side of the Arve and along the Somme river, seems to be the storm center of the French battle front.

The Germans have been repulsed in an attempt to retake the village of Hamelet and the wooded portions further south. The British official report says the enemy was stopped easily, but the Germans claim to have checked the British forces east of Hamelet and to have thrown them back to their original lines at Villers-Bretonneux.

With exception of aerial combats, the American front has been calm. The German official statement tells of British attacks in the Ypres region, adding that they were repulsed. Heavy artillery fire in this neighborhood is reported from London.

The French have been content to hold and consolidate their new positions near Moulin-sous-Touvent and Autrech, northwest of Soissons. The French war office says during the past day there has been heavy artillery firing near Cury and Montgobert southwest of Soissons.

Italian forces operating near the mouth of the Piave have continued to make progress, taking more than

400 prisoners as well as a battery of cannon and many machine guns. In the mountain region, the Italians have extended their lines northeast of Monte Grappa and have repulsed desperate counter-attacks by the Austrians against positions taken from the enemy in the Italian drives a week ago.

Stockholm reports that Finland is expected to declare war on the entente allies. This is probably the result of German pressure incident to the landing of allied forces at Kola on the Murman coast.

Two rumors of international despatches have become current. One is to the effect that the death of Mohammed V, sultan of Turkey, was not due to natural causes, but the result of a revolt in his country. The premier Botha of the Union of South Africa says the trouble may be attributed to enemy agencies.

The premier has made an appeal to the people.

The Czech-Slovak troops in Eastern Siberia are reported to have won over the Bolshevik forces holding Irkutsk. Reports from London say the Bolshevik army, which includes many German and Austrian prisoners, has been driven out of the region of Irkutsk into the coast of Lake Baikal.
