CHICAGO, July 5.—Oats took
the lead in speculative activity today, owing to strength at Winnipeg, and forced an advance here in corn. The oats market closed firm 1 to 1 1/2c higher, with August 7 1/2 @ 7 3/4 to 7 1/2c. Corn gained 3/4 to 1 1/2c net and finished unsettled, with August \$1.54 to \$1.54 1/2 and September \$1.55 1/2 @ 1 1/2c.

The outcome in provisions was a
rise of 7/10 to 30c.
Dry weather reports from the Canadian northwest dominated the oats market, and more than offset favorable weather conditions on this side of the international line. The fact that houses with northwestern connections were active buyers tended to emphasize assertions that the Canadian crop had begun to show to a material extent the effects of lack of moisture. In this connection, renewed notice was taken of recent vessel charters to carry 1,500,000 bushels of oats from Chicago to ports on the Georgian bay. Another bullish factor was gossip current that the Canadian government price for wheat soon would be raised to \$2.26, a jump of 5c a bushel.

Good crop prospects made corn
drag, but persistent buying that resulted from oats strength finally absorbed the entire surplus offerings. Eastern shipping was again in evidence. Provisions were firm with hogs.

Trading Heavy
Toward Close
One-Third of Day's Business on New York Exchange in Last Hour

NEW YORK, July 5.—One-third
of today's light trading in stocks occurred in the final hour, the early and intermediate stages of the session being punctuated by frequent pauses. The movement tended steadily upward from the opening, with maximums at the end.

United States Steel and Independent
issues of that division furnished the greater proportion of the day's operations although oil, steel, tobacco and minor war contract activity denoted further pool activity. Metals contributed moderately, but retained much of their mid-week gains.

Investment rails were again re-
lated to the background.
United States Steel made a net gain of 1 1/4, and Bethlehem and Crucible steel made extreme gains of 1 1/2 to 2 points.

Petroleum derived much of its
advance from Royal Dutch Oil, which jumped 7 1/2 points on announcement from abroad of an 18
