CAMP LEWIS MAY SEND PATROLMEN

Request Is Made by Governor Withycombe in Message to Secretary Baker

In a letter sent by teletype to Secretary of War Baker, Governor Withycombe asks that limited service men from Camp Lewis be detailed to fire patrol duty in logging camps, necessary railroad units and timber districts in Oregon. The governor has taken this action following a resolution adopted at a meeting of the state board of forestry in Portland Saturday. The board's resolution points to the danger to ship and airplane timber from fires and to the fact that crews in logging camps will be cut down seriously if they have to stop work to fight fires. The governor's night letter to the secretary of war follows: "The acute forest fire situation in Oregon now not only imperils ship and airplane material and railroads

Meat Must Be Sold

Fresh meat is perishable. It must be sold within about two weeks for whatever it will bring.

A certain amount of beef is frozen for foreign shipment, but domestic markets demand fresh, chilled, unfrozen beef.
