

HORSES WIN IN STRAIGHT HEATS

Only One Exception to Record Made Yesterday at Grand Circuit Races

CLEVELAND, July 9.—With the exception of the 2:12 pace each event on today's grand circuit card at North Randall was captured in straight heats with honors divided between favorites and outsiders.

The time trotted and paced, with exception of fast final quarters by Hal Boy, was most ordinary.

The 2:12 pace caused the biggest upset of the afternoon. After Margaret Margrave had taken the first heat she was forced to succumb in the second to Grace Elder, which paid \$414 for a \$2 pari mutual ticket. Margaret Margrave captured the deciding heat.

The first division of the Fasig 3-year-old trot went to Mamie Look, which was practically overlooked in the betting.

Selah Baird, the favorite, won the 2:20 trot rather easily from Hanks Stout.

In the 2:04 pace Hal Boy had things his own way.

NEW REPUBLIC CREATED.

Cisus Fire on Edge of Valuable Green Timber

MORTON, Wash., July 9.—The Cisus forest fire on the edge of the Rainier national forest, began spreading late today and now it covers more than 150 square miles. A crew of 100 men is fighting the flames now.

The Cisus burn is on the edge of valuable green timber. The original burn was in 1912 when the whole community for miles around was so covered with smoke that chickens went to roost and lights had to be turned on. A considerable regrowth is ruined by the new fire this year.

Jonker Loudon, minister of foreign affairs of The Netherlands was minister to the United States in 1908—13. His wife was Miss Eustis, niece of J. B. Eustis, former American ambassador to France.

August Phillips, who held the post as minister to the United States was granted leave of absence owing to ill health several months ago.

JENKS BELIEVES DROUTH EFFECT IS EXAGGERATED

Fruit Dealer Thinks Berry and Grain Crop Will Be Agreeable Surprise

SOME YARDS DRYING UP

Tendency of Pickers to Quit Without Notice Has Serious Effect

Manager W. T. Jenks of the Willamette Valley Prune association has been taking "close up" observations of the loganberry fields in this section lately, and he is emphatic in the statement that there is unnecessary apprehension as to the effect of the drouth upon the berry fields, as well as upon grain. Thus far there has been but a small proportion of sun-burned fruit, due to the cool, cloudy weather, and he believes the crop will be as much of a surprise in the aggregate as the cherry crop. It will be recalled that in the early part of the season the belief was prevalent that the cherry yield would be cut 50 per cent. The harvest reveals one of the greatest crops in the valley's history.

Mr. Jenks admits that some yards of berries as well as grain are suffering severely; some on the higher ground will be a practical failure; but a fact to be noted is that the difference in crops this season is just the difference in cultivation. In almost every instance where land has been rolled or has a dust much on the surface, the crops are showing very little effect of the drouth.

Had the labor problem been solved, it is probable that the total crop of loganberries would have compared very favorably with that last season. But immense quantities of fruit have gone over-ripe in fields where pickers quit without notice. This seems to have been the chief trouble throughout the valley. J. R. Coleman, federal labor agent, states that on his latest trip to Portland, the Oregon Electric was taking on groups of berry pickers all along the line, on their way to their homes. Being questioned, the usual reply was that they "couldn't make wages."

In addition to this, many pickers have forsaken the berry fields for the cherry orchards, where the work is either more agreeable or more profitable. This illustrates the woeful lack of organization both among the growers and the pickers. The situation would have been immensely improved if the Salem autos and trucks had come to the front and transported volunteer pickers from the city, who would have consented to go where the need was greatest.

LAWYERS CLASH IN O'LEARY CASE

Defense Charges Trial Is Result of Frame-up—Says Papers Were Stolen

NEW YORK, July 9.—Clashes of attorneys marked the trial in court here today of John J. O'Leary, a New York lawyer, charged with having aided his brother, Jeremiah A. O'Leary, to escape just before he was to be tried for publication of alleged seditious articles in the Bull.

In opening for the defense, Thomas B. Felder called the case against his client a "frame up."

Earlier in the day, Mr. Felder objected to the admission of certain evidence on the ground that Jeremiah O'Leary's office had been "raided" and papers illegally seized.

Mr. Barnes said this was a "false statement." Mr. Felder replied: "You are a liar."

After Mme. K. De Victorica, indicted with Jeremiah O'Leary, and others on charges of conspiracy to commit treason and espionage, had been identified in court by Jeremiah's office boy as a woman who had called twice on his employer last year Mr. Felder, notwithstanding his various objections, was called as a witness by the government.

After being examined as to his engagement as counsel for the O'Learys Mr. Felder cross-examined himself before opening the case for the defense.

Church to Have More Than Million Members

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 9.—As the result of a conference here today of the general ways and means committee, nearly 1,300,000 church members are to be brought under one jurisdictional head in the United Lutheran Church, which is either to be incorporated by act of congress or under the laws of New York state, depending on a decision to be reached tomorrow.

Sentiment north and south is said to be unanimously behind the re-establishment of an American church, which later may embrace the recently merged Norwegian Lutheran church in America. The bodies interested include the General Synod with 475,749 communicants, the General Council with 770,000 and the United Synod of the South, which has 73,510 members.

NO PROHIBITION VOTE YET TAKEN

Amendment Discussed in Senate—Other Action Expected First

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Although national prohibition as a war measure was discussed briefly in the senate today, the amendment to the emergency agricultural appropriation bill was not taken up. When the amendment was reached Senator Penrose of Pennsylvania arose to a point of order which he made today against the inclusion of it in the bill on the ground that it is general legislation attached to an appropriation measure in violation of the rules.

The senate today proceeded with consideration of other amendments to the emergency bill approved by the agricultural committee, but finally cut its resolution short because committee members were not present to explain the reasons for the provisions. Prohibition leaders charged the slow progress was due to efforts of opponents to delay action in the hope that the telegraph control resolution would be brought before the senate. Opponents denied any such intention.

ADMINISTRATION CARRIES BALLOT

Robinson and White Made Grand Secretary and Treasurer of B. P. O. E.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 9.—The administration made a clean sweep today in the election of officers at the annual meeting of the grand lodge of Elks, all of its candidates being successful.

Fred C. Robinson, Dubuque, Ia., and Charles White, Chicago, won over James Richardson, Cincinnati, and J. F. Brennan, Denison, Texas, respectively, for grand secretary and grand treasurer. Bruce A. Campbell, of East St. Louis, Ill., was chosen grand exalted ruler without opposition. Other officers elected were: Thomas L. Reilly, Meriden, Conn., grand esteemed leading knight; O. K. Cowell, Sunbury, Pa., grand esteemed loyal knight; E. L. Chapman, Great Bend, Kan., grand esteemed lecturing knight; C. B. Horn, Colorado Springs, grand tiller; W. H. Brown, Santa Monica, Cal., grand inner guard; C. F. J. McCue, Cambridge, Mass., grand trustee, five-year term, and W. E. Braken, Albany, N. Y., trustee, one-year term.

Atlantic City was selected for the 1919 reunion.

A second million dollar fund was voted by the delegates for war relief work. The money is to be under the care of a commission, headed by John K. Tener, former governor of Pennsylvania.
