WINE IS CONDENSED.

PARIS, July 3.—"Condensed wine" is promised by Food Minister Boret as one of his measures for saving tonnage. There is a large supply of wine in Algeria, but difficulties of transport prevent bringing it to France. The minister appealed to the scientific world and a method has

been discovered of reducing the wines to a sort of honey which only needs diluting to bring it back to its previous state. The process is still in the laboratory stage but the minister is assured of its practical realization and expects to make an economy of four-fifths of the freight which would be necessary if these wines were shipped in barrels.

PORTLAND WILL GET BIG MONEY

Established at once at the plant of the Columbia River Shipbuilding corporation plant," said Mr. Schwab, "and with these added facilities the company will be enabled to turn out 20 steel steamers of 800 tons each year. While I am in Portland I shall arrange to award enough new contracts to the Northwest steel company to justify it in enlarging its plant. I expect from the Pacific Northwest the greatest proportionate production of ships that we will get from any district in the United States in the coming year."

One shipbuilding firm, the G. M. Standifer construction company celebrated Mr. Schwab's visit by launching six completed wooden hulls from its two yards today. It was said to be the biggest day's launching of wooden vessels by a single firm on record in American shipbuilding. The aggregate tonnage of the vessels launched was 22,000 tons.

Mr. Schwab visited a number of the shipbuilding plants today, and tonight reviewed a parade of 20,000 shipbuilders, after which he addressed a mass meeting at Multnomah field. Tomorrow he will rest here.

AMERICA WILL HONOR FRENCH HEROISM TODAY

Anniversary of Fall of the Bastille Given Recognition

TRI-COLOR FLAGS FLY

Wilson Sends Message of Greeting From U. S. to President Poincare

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Bastille day will be celebrated tomorrow by America in honor of the heroic part France is playing in the defense of the liberties of the world. President Wilson today ordered that the French flag be displayed over all public buildings and ships at home and abroad, and had a special flag-staff placed on the White House to bear the national ensign of France beside the Stars and Stripes.

Tonight the president sent the following message to President Poincare: "America greets France on this day of stirring memories with a heart full of warm friendship and of devotion to the great cause in which the two peoples are now so happily united. July 14, like our own July 4, has taken on a new significance not only for France, but for the world. As France celebrated our Fourth of July so do we celebrate her 14th, keenly conscious of a comradeship of arms and of purpose of which we are deeply proud."

Sen Seem's Narrow. "The sea seems very narrow today. France is so close a neighbor to our hearts. The war is being fought to save ourselves from intolerable things, but it is also fought to save mankind. We extend our hands to each other, to the great peoples with whom we are associated, and to the peoples everywhere who love right and prize justice as a thing beyond price, and consecrate ourselves once more to the noble enterprise of peace and justice, realizing the great conceptions that have lifted France and America high among the free peoples of the world."

"The French flag flies today from the staff of the White House, and America is happy to honor that flag."

Secretary Daniels has been designated to attend the Bastille day meeting at New York tomorrow evening as the president's personal representative. The British and French ambassadors will be among the speakers.

WARNING SENT TO LUMBERMEN

State Forester Reminds Timbermen of Danger to Property and Life

As a warning against the possibility of disastrous forest fires during the present extremely dry season, State Forester F. A. Elliott has sent a letter to all Oregon lumbermen urging them to observe every possible precaution in logging camps and at lumber mills. The lumbermen are reminded that the least carelessness with fire may cause great loss of property and life and require the labor of hundreds of men who should be kept in their regular lines of work. To keep fires to a minimum lumbermen are asked to observe the following precautions:

"Keep all spark arresters in repair and have them inspected often.
"Keep barrels and buckets filled with water at all donkey engines and wet the ground around the engines at frequent intervals.
"Clear a space around each engine of all debris so that fires from ash-pans will have no litter to set on fire."

"Do not set engines under trees or near snags that may catch fire from smoke stack.
"Do not move donkey engine through dry slashings or old burn through the heat of the day. Do your moving at night or very early in the morning.
"Do not leave an engine with fire in it at any time without a watchman."

"Follow all locomotives with speeder patrol equipped with fire fighting tools.
"Do not allow locomotive engines to clean out ash pans or fire boxes in unsafe places.
"Prevent as much as possible any smoking in the woods. Governor Withycombe has just issued a proclamation urging this."

"Instruct each employee to make fire prevention and suppression his first duty. Do not keep an employee on your payroll who refuses to fight fire in an emergency."

OREGON FRUIT IS THE FINEST

Cherries of The 1918 Crop
Are Superior to Any in
The Country

The packing of cherries in the warehouses of the Salem Fruit Union which has been in progress for the past two weeks, was practically finished up Saturday night. Since the beginning of the season they have barreled up twelve carloads or about 200 tons of cherries for shipment to the California Glace Fruit company of San Francisco, the largest institution of its kind in the United States.

A. C. Raas, representing the California company, has been supervising the work of packing, and he states unqualifiedly that in all the twenty years in which he has been shipping cherries from this territory he has never seen fruit of such beautiful color and fine quality. He says further that no such cherries are to be found outside of the Salem district. Probably fifty per cent more cherries are shipped to the California plant from Oregon than from California growers. Figuring roughly, Mr. Raas estimates that this pack of cherries will leave something like \$25,000 in the Salem district.

The process of bleaching and preserving the cherries is a very interesting one, the California company having a secret method which has not been duplicated by any firm in the country. By this process the cherries are bleached to a pale yellow and will keep indefinitely in the solution without deteriorating. When made in to either maraschino or glace cherries they are artificially stained a brilliant red and are semi-transparent.

Falls City Plant Is Allowed Rate Increase

By order of the public service commission the Falls City Electric Light and Power company is authorized to increase its rates, not to the extent, however, asked for in the application. The order is effective August 1. "Testimony adduced at the hearing," says the order, "developed that the metered service consumer has enjoyed a preferential rate insufficient to carry a fair share of the expense, as compared with the flat rate customers, and also tended to justify the applicant's claim of the necessity for increased revenue in order properly to continue the service."

Port Officials in Salem to Confer With Senator

W. E. Hall, commissioner of the port of Toledo, and C. R. Wright, port engineer, were in Salem yesterday in conference with United States Senator McNary and Public Service Commissioner Frank J. Miller relative to increased railroad freight rates as they affect the construction of a jetty project at Toledo. 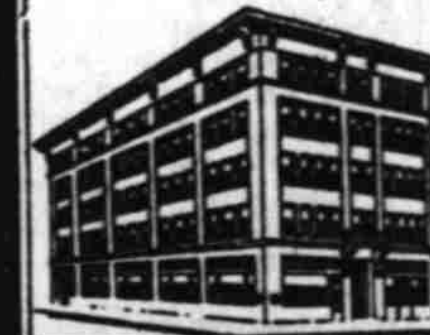
