while they are striving to reach their aim. It is said there is no desire on the part of the American government to intervene in Russian affairs, but that it favors the dispatch of sufficient forces to leave the Czecho-Slovak free to insure the safe arrival of their comrades from their interior.

The impression here tonight is that Japan, in a spirit of cooperation with her allies, will follow the suggestion, and, like, Americans, send troops. Great Britain and France, it is said, also will send small contingents so as to make the move inter-allied.

TO LAND TROOPS
SHANGHAI, July 18.—(By the A. P.)—A dispatch to the daily News from Peking says the allies have decided on joint intervention in Siberia in landing of British, French, Japanese and American contingents. These however, will occupy Vladivostok, so as to permit the Czecho-Slovaks to operate inland.

The correspondent adds that he understands the aggregate allied force will not exceed one division.

NO ANNOUNCEMENTS YET
WASHINGTON, July 18.—Tokio and London dispatches announcing that Japan practically has accepted the proposals of the United States as to the method of extending military aid to Russia in Siberia have not altered the determination of the government here to permit no announcements on the subject.

Further than an official admission that negotiations have been going on for some time with Great Britain, Japan and France looking to the adoption of a common policy, absolutely nothing was made available for publication. Information of the progress of the negotiations, in accord in the main with the announcements printed today in London and in Tokio, has been available unofficially here within the last two or three days but all attempts to secure some official sanction for its publication have been met with the statement that the situation had best not be discussed at all.

Dry Spell Broken Last Night by Light Rainfall

The long drouth was bent if not broken when a light rain fell last night between 9:30 o'clock and midnight. The precipitation was sufficient to wet up the paved streets and put a refreshing smell into the atmosphere, but as far as being favorable or unfavorable to crops the fall was so light as to be neutral. The fall was the heaviest since the early part of May.

Carmack Family Goes to Limit Baying War Stamps

INDEPENDENCE, Or., July 17.—Five thousand dollars worth of war saving stamps is represented by the Carmack family here. There are five persons in the family and each has purchased the limit of \$1000 worth of stamps besides investing liberally in liberty bonds and supporting the Red Cross. A son of the family is in France. The five who have bought stamps are S. E. Carmack, Mrs. S. E. Carmack, Ethel Carmack, Millie Carmack and Mrs. Elizabeth Stewart, Mr. Carmack's mother.

Ex-Congressman Arrested for Stopping Bond Sale

PITTSBURG, Kansas, July 17.—E. R. Ridgely, a former congressman, was arrested at his home today on a charge of violating the espionage act by attempting to obstruct the sale of government bonds.

Ridgely, who was a Populist, served in congress from 1897 to 1901. He is 75 years old.

NO GERMAN ON PHONES.

ST. LOUIS, S. D., July 17.—The state council of defense issued an order today prohibiting the speaking of the German language over the telephones in South Dakota. The order also prohibits this language being spoken anywhere, in public or private, in a conversation in which more than three persons are engaged.

SPIES' METHODS MADE KNOWN AT LEGAL HEARING

Means Admits Receipt of
Money From German Gov-
ernment Before War

LARGE SUMS PAID OUT

Collected Gold at Tombstone
in Trinity Church Yard,
New York

CHICAGO, July 17.—Revelations of the methods of the German spy system in the United States were made today by Gaston B. Means as the \$3,500,000 King will hearing to determine the legality of one of two instruments said to have been left by the late millionaire.

Means, who appeared as a witness for the heirs of Mrs. Maude A. King, for whose alleged slaying he was tried and acquitted in Concord, N. C., last summer, freely admitted receiving money for acting as a secret agent of the German government before the outbreak of the war with the United States.

He said he received \$85,000 at one time and \$82,000 another, for his services to Germany and of delivering \$1,300,000 which he received on a

check to Captain Boy-Ed, one of Germany's chief spies in this country, who was subsequently expelled. He received the check at a railway station, he said.

Asked regarding the services for which he received the \$92,000, Means said: "I made that money the way lots of other Americans did, some of them the biggest lawyers in New York. I can easily tell you where I collected it—right in the Trinity church yard at a designated tombstone."

The witness also admitted that he and German spies in this country were to tie up the building of electric boats, "the mosquito fleet," building for the allies in this country. Means said that he found that the boats had gun emplacements and that Captain Boy-Ed called this to the attention of the neutrality board at Washington.

"President Wilson then very properly asked him why he was doing detective work in the United States," declared Means. "And now for the first time, the public knows why Captain Boy-Ed was sent back to Germany. 'I turned all my information over to the government.'"

Negro Troops Valuable Along American Lines

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY
ON THE MARNE, July 17.—(By The A. P.)—American negro troops are helping to hold the allied line against the fifth German offensive. They requested the favor of being permitted to take over a part of the line of attack though they had been holding a piece of a French sector for the last three months without relief.

Naval Board to Pass on Promotion of Officers

WASHINGTON, July 17.—Secretary Daniels announced today that the naval selection board began sessions today to select officers for promotion. According to computations of the bureau of navigation the board will select five permanent and twenty-one temporary rear-admirals, eleven permanent and ninety-three captains and twenty-four permanent and 219 temporary commanders.

MUCH BEEF SHIPPED

NEW YORK, July 17.—The federal board announced tonight that it had received a statement from the United States food administration showing that nearly 100,000,000 pounds of beef was sent abroad in May, principally to England, France, Italy and Belgium. The shipments for the month surpassed any previous record in the history of the country.

Corn Meal Muffins.—One-half cup corn meal, one cup wheat flour, three teaspoons baking powder, two tablespoons sugar, one tablespoon melted butter, one teaspoon salt, three-fourths cup milk, one egg. Mix and sift the dry ingredients; add the milk gradually, the egg well beaten, and the melted butter; bake in a hot oven in buttered gem pans 25 minutes. This serves four people.

Dealer Steals Half Pint on Each Gallon of Fuel

J. Yeager, deputy sealer of weights and measures for Eastern Oregon, has reported to Spencer Wortman, deputy state sealer the first conviction under a law passed at the last legislature requiring dealers in gasoline to keep a standard measure on automatic pumps so that the pumps will deliver the correct amounts at all times. Mr. Yeager filed a complaint against O. A. McCrary of La Grande who was charged with delivering a half pint short on each gallon. He pleaded guilty and was fined. The law provides as penalty fines ranging from \$25 to \$500. Mr. Wortman is not informed of the amount of McCrary's fine.

Olcott Holds Up Warden's Claim for Prize Awards

Secretary of State Olcott has asked Attorney General Brown to pass on a claim of \$50 by Warden Murphy of the state penitentiary for prize money awarded to prisoners who won athletic events on July 4 in a track meet in the prison enclosure. Olcott wants to know if the claim can be allowed under chapter 261, laws of 1917, which allows an appropriation for maintenance of library, for music and literary equipment and other amusements.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, July 18.—As a result of injuries received Monday when his plane side-slipped, Cadet Joseph H. Peters died at Kelly field infirmary today. Peters came here from Long Beach, Cal., but his former home was at Starkville, Miss.

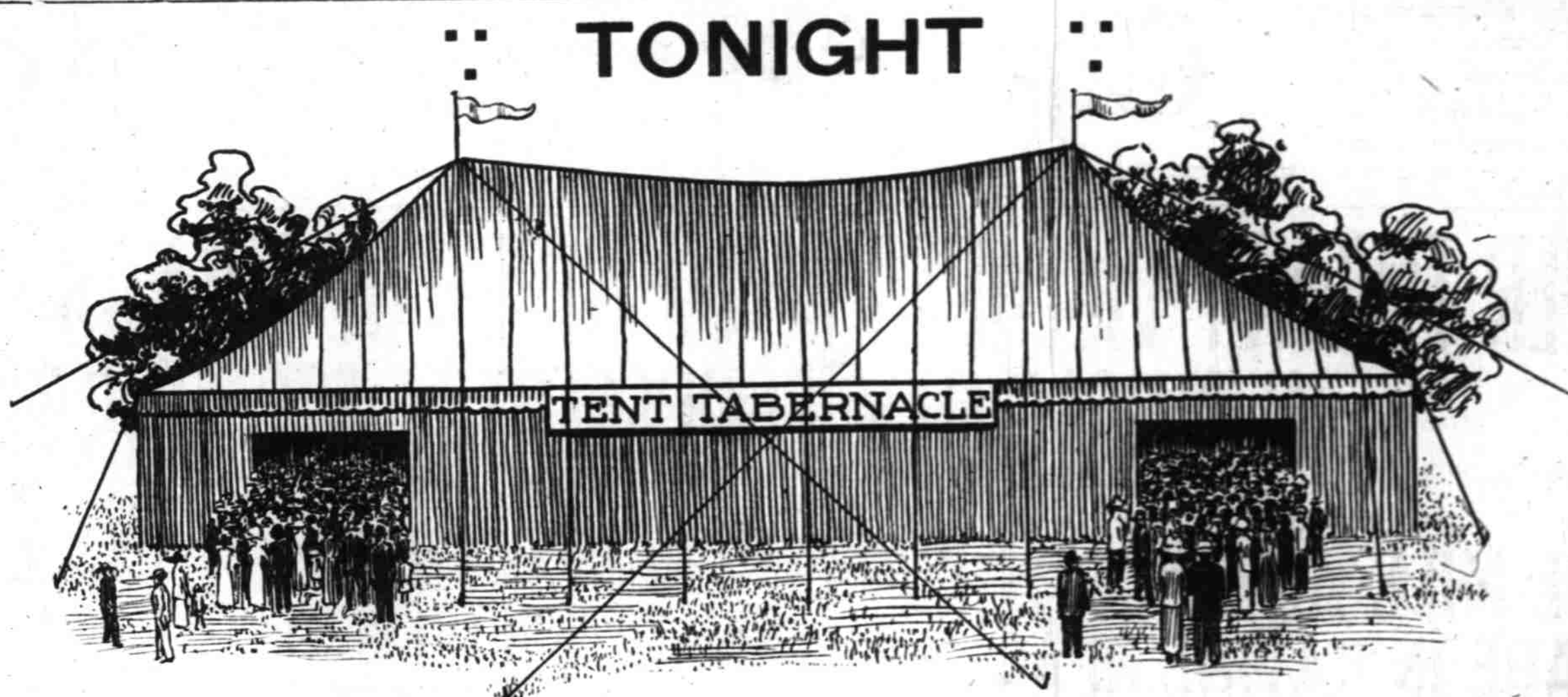

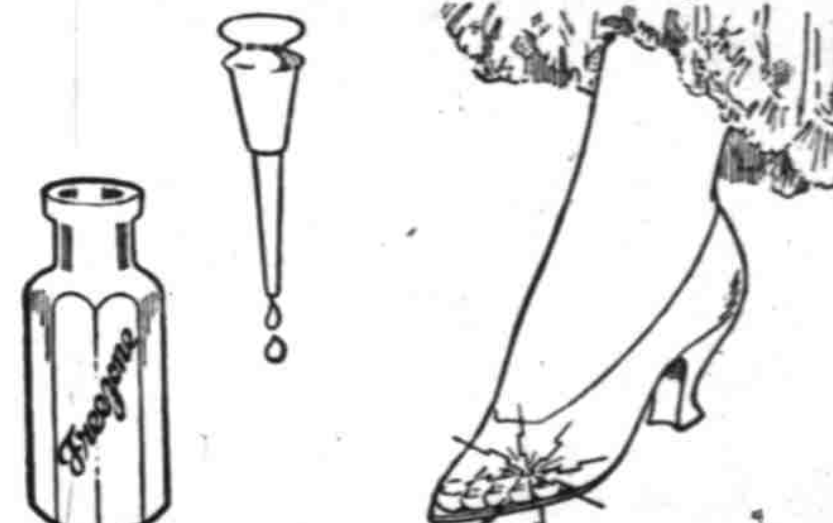
