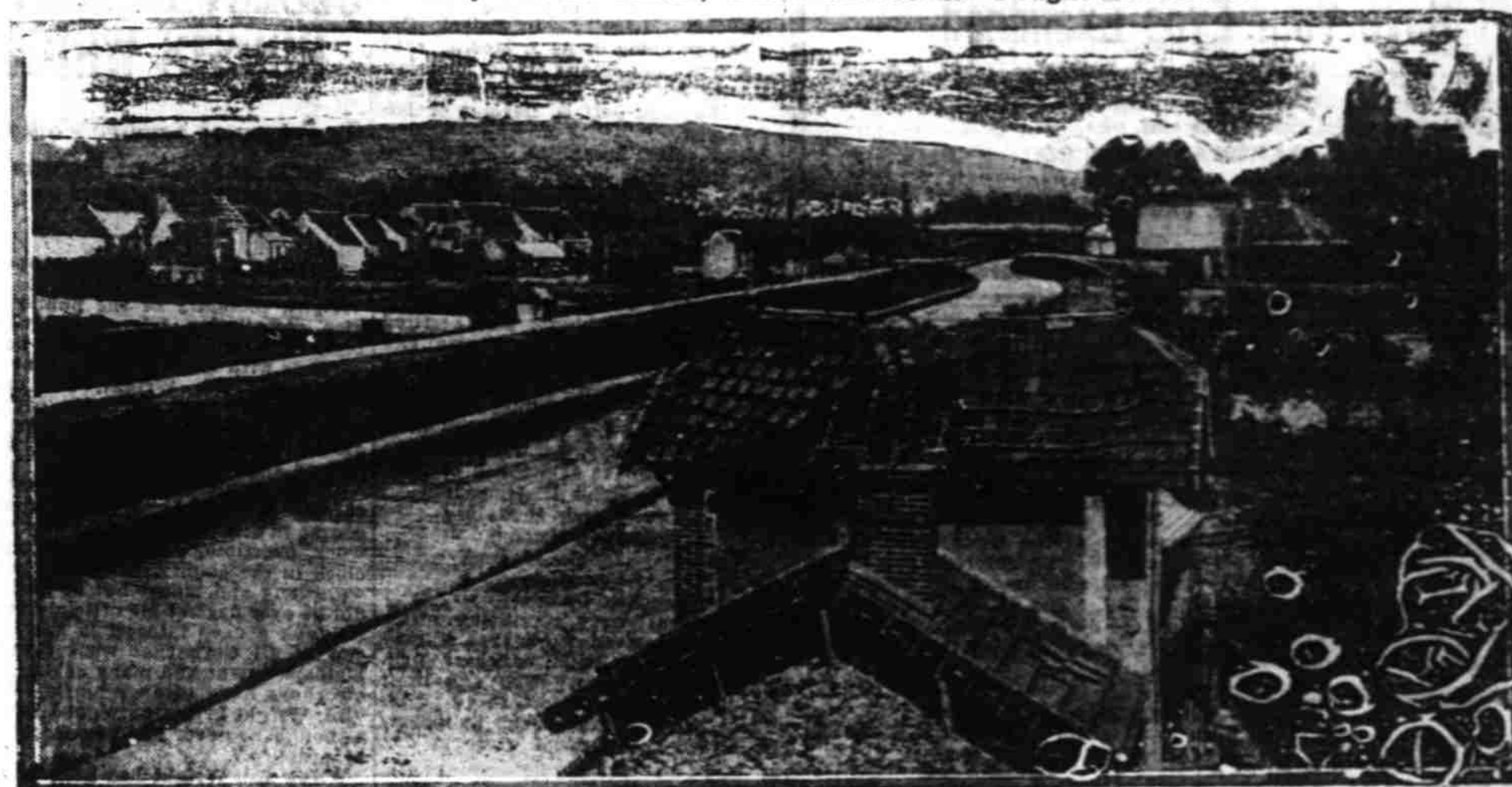

RICE INDICTED ON FIVE COUNTS

Broker Held in \$7500 Bail
for Preliminary Hearing—
Served Three Terms

NEW YORK, July 31.—Five indictments charging grand larceny were returned today against George Graham Rice, the broker whose offices were raided by federal agents here last Monday. Rice was held in \$7500 bail for a preliminary hearing.

The indictments were found on the complaints of persons who alleged money sent to Rice for the purchase of securities was diverted to some other purpose.

In making public the indictments

today the district attorney's office issued a statement in which it said Rice's offices maintained at a cost of \$2000 a week for salaries alone and his bank deposits averaged \$10,000 a day. He issued a weekly "newspaper" and claimed to have more than 53,000 customers scattered throughout the country. Rice who was connected with the Sullivan Trust company in Goldfield Nev., during the mining excitement there, has served three prison terms as the result of previous stock transactions.

PROVE SATISFACTORY

Reports Concerning De Havilland Air Machines Contradicted by Order

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Widely published reports that General Pershing had criticized the American design of the De Havilland bombing airplane and requested that no more be sent to France, led Secretary Baker to make public the fact that the general had just asked for immediate shipment of a large number of the machines.

Mr. Baker said the order had been given primarily by the department, in quick transportation. More than 100 of these type had been sent to France before the new report was received.

"There are no perfect airplanes," the war secretary in discussing reports of criticisms of the De Havilland type. "Improvements in the same type come rapidly, both as to design and as to succeeding numbers of the same types. This is true of the De Havilland as of all others. The latest machine of this type is better than the earlier ones."

Investigation of the criticisms of the De Havilland planes was begun today by the senate military subcommittee. Major H. C. A. Muhlenberg and Captains R. W. Schroeder and

J. M. Foote, aviation officers in charge of testing this type of plane at Wright field, Dayton, Ohio, were examined for several hours behind closed doors.

The committee plans to call several other officers before closing the hearings which were reopened after members of the committee had discussed with Secretary Baker and General March, chief of staff, last Saturday criticisms of the De Havilland type made by General Pershing and other officers. It was understood that the American commander in chief had suggested modifications and improvements in the plane.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Names of two officers and five enlisted men of the American expeditionary forces held as prisoners in Germany, were announced today by the war department. The death in a German hospital of Private Jerry A. Brown, of Columbus, Ohio, previously listed as missing in action, also was announced.

New England Supply of Coal Is Threatened

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Increasing demands for coal from overseas and for the emergency fleet, army, navy and other government operations threaten the New England fuel supply for next winter. Shipments to New England are now behind the schedule figured on the ratio of production necessary to supply the needs of the district, it became known.

Bituminous coal production in Pennsylvania, Maryland and West Virginia, the three states assigned to supply the new England district, was on July 13 at a ratio of 77,000,000 tons for the coal year beginning April 1, while production on that date should have been at the rate of 31,600,000 tons. Out of the allotment for New England coal must come also coal for the emergency fleet, army, navy and overseas shipments. Part of the production from Ohio fields probably will be diverted to relieve the situation.
