War Department to Enter
Shipbuilding Field Soon

WASHINGTON, July 30—The war
department will soon enter the ship-
building field. It became known to-
night that preparations practically
have been completed whereby the
department will utilize shipyards not
at present being used by the ship-
ping board.

Yards which probably will be used
includes the West Coast shipyard at
Everett, Wash., and a new yard be-
ing built at Wilmington, N. C. It
was said the war department con-
templates from four to eight ships
immediately. It was said that the
department also is considering the
building of a 10,000-ton concrete
vesel.

PROFIT-TAKING
STOPS ADVANCE

Heavy Selling by Eastern
Houses Causes Sharp Break
in Corn Prices

CHICAGO, July 31—Month-end
profit-taking by longers more than
wiped out in the corn market today
an advance due largely to rapid fall-
ing off in arrivals at leading primary
markets. The close was weak, 3/4 to
3/8c net lower, with August \$1.53 1/2
to \$1.54 and September \$1.54 1/2 to
\$1.55. Oats finished 1/2c off to 2 1/4c
up. In provisions, the outcome
ranged from 20c decline to 65c ad-
vance.

Heavy selling in which houses
with eastern connections were promi-
nent forced a sharp break in corn
prices during the last hour of trad-
ing. Relative lightness of receipts
together with prospects of further
decrease in movement from the coun-
try had much to do with shaping the
temporary upward course of values.

Besides eastern cash demand con-
tinued good.

Something of a bullish flurry in
July oats resulted from belated cov-
ering by shorts. August and Sep-
tember oats weakened with corn.

Nearly all deliveries of provisions
reflected the strength of the hog
market.

STEEL PRINCIPAL
ISSUE IN STOCKS

New York Trading Shows
Lack of Public Interest in
Securities

NEW YORK, July 31—The stock
market's lukewarm response today
to the record-breaking statement of
the United States Steel corporation
issued after the close of yesterday's
session, was in itself considered a
striking proof of the utter lack of
public interest in securities.

Steel eclipsed all other issues, fur-
