For a period of about nine years in the administrations of Lord and Penoyer at the Capitol, he was in charge of the penitentiary and he makes the boast that during all that time there was not a single escape from the institution.

Beck on a Long Tour

Harry Beck, the big operator of the Portland fire department, drove into town last night on his way back to Portland after a thousand-mile jaunt by motorcycle down into the lower regions of California. He claims to have averaged about 200 miles a day, and on some of the fine California roads he made nearly 350 miles a day. China Pheasants Liberated

Considerable interest centered about the Watt Ship store recently when a flock of young China pheasants were received from the Simpson Pheasant farm near Corvallis. There were twenty-four of the handsome birds in the flock, which was to be turned loose upon the big Wallace fruit farm in Polk county, a few miles from Salem. This farm is protected against hunters and so selected as a favorable spot for the birds. Hundreds of China pheasants and other game birds are hatched every year at the Simpson farm and consigned on request to regions in the state where they will have a chance for their lives.

Dr. W. L. Pemberton, former resident of Salem and a graduate of the Willamette school of medicine, arrived in the city yesterday in the course of a 1000-mile auto trip around the state. He has been located for several years at Myrtle Point where he has built up a good practice. FRUIT RATE IS UNDER PROTEST

Public Service Commission Sends Its Authority to Mr. Calderhead

The Oregon public service commission today wired the Washington state commission to inform O. O. Calderhead at Washington, D. C., that he has authority of the Oregon commission to represent it in a new or amended complaint protesting against a 25 per cent freight rate increase on fresh and canned fruits, vegetables and fruit juices, and also against a 10 per cent express rate increase if the Washington commission wants the Oregon commission to join in the latter. The complaint is to be filed before the interstate commerce commission. Mr. Calderhead, who is a member of the Washington state commission, wired for that body to obtain for him the authority of the Oregon and the Idaho commissions.

OBITUARY

Jerome Walter Martin was born April 11, 1864, near McMinnville, Yamhill county, Oregon, where his parents, Nehemia and Eliza Lois Middick Martin had settled on a donation claim in 1844. The family came from New York by ox team.

He was the second male child born in Oregon territory and for a number of years had held the distinction of being the oldest white man born in Oregon.

He was married May 8, 1869, to Miss Mary Julia Phillips of Polk county. To this union were born twelve children of whom nine are living. The deceased leaves his widow, Mary J. Martin, and children: Leo J. Martin, Miss Bessie Martin of Tekoa, Wash.; Mrs. W. F. Graner and Mrs. O. H. Emmons of Cheney, Wash., and John E. Martin and Chester C. Martin who are in the United States service en route to France.

Mr. Martin also leaves one brother, Flint Martin, of McMinnville, and two sisters, Nancy Watt of Inchelium, Wash., and Caroline Ford living in California.

Mr. Martin and his family came to Washington in 1898 and have lived in and near Wilbur for sixteen years.

For three years and seven months Mr. Martin suffered from an illness which neither medical skill nor tenderest nursing could conquer. His last months were helpless. His children, as many as could be gathered, were at his bedside when he died on the morning of Thursday, July 25, 1918, about 5 o'clock.

Mr. Martin was a resident of Spring Valley for a number of years, having lived on what is now the J. K. Sears farm.

sea and was drowned.

When the steward regained the deck he rushed below to get some of his clothes. "I stumbled over wounded in the darkness," he said. "Depth bombs were shaking the ship. I finally found my cubby and obtained some clothes and returned to the deck. There I was placed in another boat which managed to go free without disaster. The warlike settled slowly at the stern and then suspended. When the waters reached the boilers they blew up in a terrific column of fire and steam and then darkness fell again."

The American Red Cross is making the survivors comfortable.

It is officially reported that Alexander Kerensky will not come to the United States. He has gone to Rome to see how the Romans do.

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FIGURES GIVEN BY COMMISSION

Industrial Accident Board Has Total of \$3,433,127.56 in Treasury

A financial statement issued by the state highway commission yesterday shows that since November 30, 1916, the beginning of the present biennium for the commission, there has accumulated from the commission's four funds a total of \$3,433,127.56. Of this amount \$2,060,057.90 has been expended, leaving a balance August 5 amounting to \$1,373,069.66.

The figures entering into the totals are as follows:

Quarter mill and automobile license fund—total, \$992,504.24; expended, \$615,468.47; balance, \$377,035.77.

Six million dollar bond fund—total, \$2,049,738.88; expended, \$1,441,885.07; balance, \$607,853.81.

Bean-Barrett bonds—total, \$390,884.44; expended, \$2,604.36; balance, \$388,280.08.

The next allotment of the automobile license fund will be October 1, 1918, and according to the estimate of Secretary of State Olcott will be about \$125,000. Of this amount \$44,900 will be required to pay interest on bonds before the automobile license fund of April 1, 1919, is available.

Delinquent Certificates Dealt in by New Concern

The F. H. Wellcome company, a Minneapolis concern, was yesterday issued a permit to operate in Oregon by Corporation Commissioner Schulderman. The capitalization is \$100,000, and the attorney in fact for Oregon is G. R. Harper, whose address is in care of the tax and right of way agent of the Southern Pacific company at Portland. The company will purchase certificates of delinquency issued by the tax collectors of Oregon counties, pay subsequent or prior taxes for attachment, foreclose on such certificates as are not redeemed and will deal in titles which may result from the foreclosures. The officers and directors of the company are: F. H. Wellcome, president; Thomas Albert, vice president; R. C. Patton, treasurer; E. M. Cloyes, secretary, and M. A. Nye, assistant treasurer. All are of Minneapolis.

Four Escapes Are Again Behind Walls of Prison

Fred Thurber, burglar from Umatilla county, who escaped from the state penitentiary with Bennett Thompson Monday night of last week, was returned to the prison Sunday. Sunday night officers came in with three other convicts who escaped last Wednesday night. They were James Kelly, Multnomah county, doing from two to five years for burglary; H. Armstrong, Lane county, one to seven years for larceny; and C. D. Jones, Hood River county, two to five years for burglary. Thurber was captured near Gresham and the other three in the Tualatin neighborhood. Thompson is still at large and Thurber says he knows nothing of his whereabouts.

Insane Patients Force Their Way Out of Ward

Forcing their way through a window in the third story of the infirmary ward at the state hospital, then going down a stairway, Edwin Skog of Multnomah county and J. D. Peffly of Jackson county escaped Sunday night. Skog was returned yesterday morning, but Peffly is still at large. He is believed to have been seen near Turner. Both men are quiet and considered harmless. Skog is a Norwegian and the government holds a warrant for his deportation as soon as the war will permit.

Financial Statement Is Prepared by Commission

A financial statement prepared by the industrial accident commission shows that on July 31 the balance in the accident fund was \$1,247,647.26 and the balance in the segregated fund \$1,285,961.69, or a total balance of \$2,533,608.95.

Receipts from November 5, 1914, when the law became operative, to July 31, this year, were \$4,796,575.60 and disbursements were \$3,548,928.34.

Administrative expenses for July were \$13,176.24.

END OF THRILLING FIGHT IS SINKING

Presence of another raider in the waters off the middle Atlantic coast where, in May and June upwards of twenty vessels were sunk, became known today when the navy department announced the sinking of the Jennings and the landing of from thirty to thirty-two members of the crew at Norfolk by a American patrol boat. A second small boat from the tanker with the captain and 13 men is missing but as the weather has been good, officials confidently hope it will be picked up.

Details of the sinking were lacking but from the fact that the steamer sent a wireless saying she was being shelled and asking for assistance officials assumed that the submarine opened fire without giving the crew time to take to the boats. Patrolboats answered the radio calls but neither the Jennings nor the submarine was in sight when they arrived Sunday night at the position given by the steamer. Later survivors were found.

The submarine which has been operating for several days in Canadian

Marion County Man Held at Bend Upon Advice from Sheriff Needham

Ernest Feller, well known in Marion county, was arrested at Bend Sunday night on advice from Sheriff Needham of Salem, and will be returned here to answer to a charge of larceny by baillee. Feller has been having domestic trouble, it is said, and he and his wife have been separated, with a divorce suit pending. Saturday night Feller took his 3-year-old son and an automobile on which his father had a mortgage and started for California. The complaint was sworn to by his father, who is prominent in county politics, and who was a Republican candidate for the nomination for county commissioner in the late primary election.

Guard Companies Defined for Information of Public

For the further information of people who do not completely understand the many guard organizations of Salem, a member of one of the local companies sums up the three distinct organizations as follows: first the home guards which are maintained by the city or county in which they are located and who are permitted to wear only the hat cord worn by the Boy scouts, blue and white (there are no home guard companies in Salem). Next are the Oregon guard maintained by the state of Oregon and the same as the old Oregon militia, being identical to Company M when it left here for Clackamas in 1916, preparatory to being mustered into the federal service for border duty. There are four companies of them here, E, F, G, and separate Company B. Last is the Oregon National guard or the National guard of Oregon being under federal control, and equipped by the war department and subject to call anywhere in the United States or her possessions on the same footing as Company M when it left here the last time in 1917 for Clackamas. There are now being organized here a company of infantry and a machine gun company. The two latter organizations are permitted to wear the regulation light blue infantry hat cord and military courtesies are exchanged with the regular U. S. army while the U. S. army does not recognize the home guard.

The machine gun company will be the first unit of the Oregon National guard to complete its quota of men as it lacks, but very few at present and any men with previous military service above the age of draft or young men under 21 and over 18 desiring service for the country would be welcome additions to the ranks, also any men with in the age of draft may join as it would afford them an opportunity to familiarize themselves with machine gun tactics.
