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VANDERBILT TO COMMAND CAMP

Order Assigns New York Brigadier General to Head of Three Brigades

CAMP LEWIS, TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 6.—Brigadier General Cornelius Vanderbilt of New York will be the next commander of Camp Lewis. He is expected to arrive tomorrow or Thursday.

The order definitely assigning him to command one of the three brigades arrived by mail today and officers at division headquarters have private advice, they said, the general would report within 48 hours.

Whether General Vanderbilt will be division commander is not known. No further announcement has been made regarding the general officers who will be stationed here but, as senior officer, in camp until the arrival of another who outranks him, General Vanderbilt temporarily will have command of the Thirteenth division as well as being camp commander. He will succeed Colonel E. N. Jones, present camp commander, who will return to his regiment, relieving Major George Halloran.

Major Ragnarvald Hvoslef, military attaché to the Norwegian legation in Washington, D. C., who is touring the American camps, inspected Camp Lewis today.

Reporting with telegraph orders to assume the duties as camp adjutant, Major C. D. Houghton arrived here today from Camp Sherman, Chillicothe, Ohio. He will succeed Captain H. D. Mack, who today was appointed acting division adjutant.

Carrier pigeons bearing messages to the camp commander will be released from Paradise park, at the foot of Mount Rainier by Colonel E. N. Jones, Sunday. The test is to determine the efficiency of the pigeons in maintaining a liaison over such long distance.

Picked Up On The Street

DISTRICT ATTORNEY GELHAR expresses endorsement of the action of Judge Tucker, of Portland, who has taken steps to discourage rapid flow of divorce cases through the Multnomah county courts by making it impossible for a divorce suit to be carried through without a contest in a week or ten days. The number of suits brought in Multnomah county is appalling, there being 110 new suits filed during the month of July.

Mr. Gelhar notes that the presiding judge may modify to a great extent the procedure in court without in any manner impeding the statutes, as has been done in Marion county by Judge Bingham. During the past year of more there has been a marked reduction in the number of divorces granted in this court.

A number of cases have been disallowed and of these couples several have become reconciled. Peculiarly enough, Mr. Gelhar notes that the war has had a tendency to increase the applications for divorce, as well as faithfulness and delinquency.

The greater number of suits are brought on the ground of "cruel and inhuman treatment," but Mr. Gelhar says in many instances there is a ridiculous attempt to make a trifling offense appear as cruelty. In his opinion the great majority of cases are based upon causes that do not warrant a decree of divorce, most of the decrees being obtained through default—one or the other of the parties failing to appear in court.

BURROS NOW LEATHER.

JUAREZ, Mex., Aug. 3.—The lowly little burros which run wild over the plains of Chihuahua are being killed to furnish leather for the American army. These burros are being rounded up near Casas Grandes and shot and their hides tanned for making military equipment. The burro hides are not thick enough to be made into shoes but sufficiently thick to be manufactured into leather bags, belts and other equipment.
