## RUSSIAN CAPTAIN IN WASHINGTON

**Tells of Experiences Among Army of Escaped Czech Prisoners**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Captain Vladimir Hurban, formerly of the Russian army but who is now in the army of Czech-Slovaks, has reached Washington.

Captain Hurban gave the Associated Press an account of some of the experiences of the army of escaped prisoners. He told how after the Boleshviki government of the Czech-Slovak army of 50,000 men was in Ukraine. The Germans advanced against the Czechs in overwhelming numbers and the emperor of Austria sent a special envoy with the promise that if the Czechs disarmed they would receive amnesty and their lands would be made free.

The answer was that they would have no dealings with the Austrian emperor. A battle with the Czechs was fought for four days during the retreat from Kiev and the Czechs were victorious to a point where the German commander offered a 48 hours truce, which was accepted. In this battle they lost about 600 men while 2000 Germans were buried in one day.

Thus the Czechs escaped from Ukraine and still maintained friendly relations with the Boleshviki. They turned over arms, horses, automobiles and other equipment which had been taken from the Germans to a large extent. Later at Irkutsk a train with 400 Czechs on board armed with ten rifles and twenty hand grenades was surrounded by several thousand red guards equipped with machine guns and cannon. At a command in German the red guards began firing. The Czechs jumped from the train and in five minutes, Captain Hurban says, all the machine guns were in their possession, the Russian Boleshviki disarmed and all the Germans and Magyars "done away with."

## Denver Will Control Its Own Water Plant

**Administration of the plant will be vested in a municipal water commission.**

DENVER, COLO., Aug. 6.—Municipal ownership of the water plant was voted today in Denver by a heavy majority, according to incomplete returns. The proposal was in the form of a bond issue for \$13,370,000 submitted to the taxpayers. This valuation for its plant has been accepted by the Denver Union Water Company, from whom the city purchased.

## Saskatchewan Wheat Now Being Harvested

**Wheat cutting has commenced in Saskatchewan. Reports at hand tonight show that farmers in the Maple creek district commenced cutting operations a few days ago, while at Lensford and Lancer the binders were in the fields on Saturday.**

In some districts in the extreme west heavy cutting will be general in a week or ten days. Reports from many parts of the province show that the grain is commencing to turn.

## FEW MEN VISIT STOCK EXCHANGE Intense Heat in New York Reduces Attendance of Traders to Minimum

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—The intense heat, which reduced attendance to a minimum and caused partial suspension of operations at industrial committee of specialists, contributed to today's nominal stock market.

Leaders were sluggish from the outset. The most conspicuous included General Motors, which reacted 3 1/2 points, but rallied later, and tobaccos with recessions ranging two to five points.

U. S. Steel rose and fell within fractional limits, supplying less than its usual quota and ending virtually unchanged.

Kindred shares fluctuated in the same restricted manner. Metals were motionless until the last hour, when some slight reaction ensued on announcement that the war industries board had declined to grant an increase in the current price of copper. Sales amounted to 158,000 shares.

Bonds were inactive, although the French issues showed more strength. Total sales, par value, \$5,595,000.

## LEVY CAUSE OF FINANCE CLASH Experts of Treasury Department Disagree With House Committee

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Differences between the house ways and means committee and tax experts of the treasury department looking into the method of levying excess profits taxes to be inserted in the \$8,000,000 war revenue bill now being framed were considered today by the committee and Dr. T. S. Adams, chairman of the treasury's excess profits advisory board.

Chairman Kitchin at the close of the session announced that the committee would adopt an alternative system of applying pre-war profits as a basis where they could produce greater revenue than the excess profits tax. He also said the committee and treasury would "get together" on the excess profits tax as soon as Secretary McAdoo had gone over the system tentatively adopted by the committee. The plan of superimposing a strictly war profits tax in addition to the excess profits tax did not develop much support in the committee today.

The excess profits levy, upon which the treasury and the committee differ, hinges largely on a matter of deductions to be allowed.
