

LLOYD RIGDON GOES THROUGH

Member of Large Contingent Going From Camp Lewis to Camp Fremont

Looking every inch a soldier, Lloyd T. Rigdon, until a few months ago prominent local business man and member of the city council, passed through Salem last night as one of a large number of soldiers being transferred from Camp Lewis to Camp Fremont. Three trainloads, or about 3000 men, went through. Rigdon succeeded in slipping a pink sheet of paper out of the car window at Woodburn, to a small boy standing by, on which was a message asking the boy to notify his parents at Salem that he would be passing through. Just 13 minutes before train time the family received the word and were on the spot to greet him. His father, W. T. Rigdon, was at the Iowa picnic at the state fair grounds and was too late to meet his son.

Stringless Beans Used By Evaporating Plant

Within the past two weeks 60 tons of beans have been used by the Wittenberg-King plant in preparing the dehydrated vegetable product. Probably 40 tons more will be utilized before the season is over.

The beans are of fine quality but the yield is not heavy and deliveries have been slow on this account. Rain is helping the second picking, which narrowly escaped destruction by the drought. Only one variety, the Burpee stringless, is being used. Large quantities of the beans are being shipped in from points as far away as Clatskanie. Over 100 women are engaged in stringing and breaking them up preparatory for the evaporating process. No machinery is used in this work.

The plant will begin drying prunes after the bean crop has been handled.

A Correction

Editor Statesman: Jean Gut's account of the murder of Marshal Bazaine in Mexico by a French sailor, as printed in Statesman of August 17, does not seem to be in accord with the accepted version of his death. Bazaine was court-martialed for treason after the Franco-Prussian war, and sentenced to degradation and death for having failed to do his duty at the siege of Metz. This was commuted to twenty years imprisonment, and he was confined in a fortress on the Ile Sainte-Marguerite, on the southern coast of France. He escaped in 1874, and made his way to Madrid, where he died, apparently from natural causes, in 1888. He seems never to have been in Mexico, except during the campaign which resulted in placing Maximilian on the throne of that country, when for

Securities Commission Asked to Approve Bonds

State Engineer John H. Lewis yesterday received application from the Squaw Creek Irrigation district from Deschutes county for approval by the irrigation securities commission of \$98,000 in bonds for the purchase of canals and water rights from the Squaw Creek Irrigation company as settlement of a controversy relative to rights. The decision purchase is a development following an order of the public service commission effective September 1, 1917, granting an increase of rates to the Squaw Creek company, the people in the district having been dissatisfied with the order.

Scarcity of Sugar Not to Curtail Home Canning

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Scarcity of sugar should not curtail the canning of fruits and vegetables, the federal food board declared tonight in a statement addressed to housewives who were told plenty of sugar is available for "all immediate requirements for canning and preserving."

The statement says housewives can get sugar in 25-pound lots upon signing a certificate stating it is to be used solely for canning purposes. "It would be unfortunate if any fruits and vegetables were permitted to go to waste because of the lack of sugar," the statement said.

Conscientious Objector Saved From Firing Squad

CAMP MEAD, Md., Aug. 17.—Private Herrman Lundenson, a "conscientious objector," has been saved from the firing squad by President Wilson, but he must serve 15 years at Fort Leavenworth, and receive a dishonorable discharge for his actions. Lundenson failed to fill out his questionnaire and did not report for service when called by a Harrisburg draft board.

The courtmartial found him guilty of desertion and disobedience of orders and imposed the death penalty.
