Classes will take up the last week of August. The reason for the early opening is that the snows close the camps part of the winter and prevent attendance at school.

A transcript of appeal has been filed in the supreme court in the case of J. W. Sweeney against Jackson county, a case arising out of the issuing of \$500,000 bonds in Jackson county for the construction of the first county road paving project in the state. The lower court allowed Sweeney judgment for approximately \$30,000.

Miss Minnie Cornelius for many years a teacher in the Salem schools, has received a summons to report at once at Washington, D. C. Miss Cornelius took the Civil service examinations the first part of June, but until this call came Saturday night had not heard whether she passed successfully. Her work will be connected with the soldiers' insurance. She will leave for Washington Tuesday, accompanied by her mother.

**Road Work Totaled—**  
During the month of July road work in Marion county totaled \$55,717.75, according to a report issued by the county court. The figures follow: Macadamizing, \$6886.32; graveling, \$9878.02; bridges, \$23,758.96; general repairs and miscellaneous, \$3291.64; new tools and machinery, \$1566.55; patrolmen's salary, \$1731.60; paving, \$8604.6; Number yards gravel hauled, 4,976 12; number yards rock hauled, 1592 1-4; number yards rock crushed, 1568 3-4. Volunteer work: Men 31 1-4; teams, 11 3-4.

**Home Work Encouraged—**  
As there is no regular meeting time for those who wish to sew for the Society for Devastated France, women are being encouraged to call at the library for patterns in order that they may do home work. The once scorned old sock or stocking

has come into its own and the 40 or more women who are now working for the league in Salem are turning out infants' garments from the good portions of the material in them. On September 12 it is planned to send the first box of finished undergarments. Discarded underwear can also be used for this work.

**Big Prices Are Paid—**  
George W. Eyre last night shipped two carloads of livestock to Portland and paid some fancy prices for the lot which he gathered in two days' time. Mr. Eyre paid J. N. Smith, superintendent for the State Institute for the Feeble-minded, \$904 for 21 head of hogs, and for four of them he paid \$311.75. Another man, Morris Sewald of Polk county, brought in a wagon-load of 21 head of hogs for which Mr. Eyre paid him \$730. J. T. Byers of Polk county received \$75 for a Jersey cow that tipped the scales at 1220 pounds. In the two carloads were 124 lambs, 111 head of cattle and 99 hogs. The shipment went to Bodine & Clark of North Portland.

## GALLAGHER TELLS THRILLING TALE

## Soldier Was Aboard Hospital Ship When Torpedoed by Germans

For the first time since returned soldiers have been visiting Salem on speaking tours, Sunday and Monday this city heard a first hand description of the sinking of a hospital ship, Lieutenant J. A. Gallagher, who passed 22 months in France, was wounded severely by being buried when a big shell struck an embankment in a trench, and was aboard the Red Cross boat Lafrance on April 17, 1917, the day it was sunk in the English channel by a German submarine, thrilled capacity houses at the Oregon theatre with his graphic account of several of his experiences.

Lieutenant Gallagher enlisted as a private enlisted as a private from Alberta, Canada; receiving his commission after having crossed the Atlantic. He was injured in the head at Vimy Ridge in December, 1916, and invalided home shortly after. One of the stories he told last concerned his trip across the English channel. The boat was laden with 200 stretcher cases and 150 walking patients. The lieutenant was one of the latter.

A torpedo struck the ship in the dark and she began to list rapidly. Two British destroyers rushed to the scene and the German wounded prisoners on board the Lafrance cheered, thinking the vessels were coming to their rescue. The speaker emphasized the excellent treatment these prisoners had received up to this time and the reception with which their shouts were met. When the boats were being let down and 60 Germans rushed to one of the craft which tipped on account of defective davits, and no one made an effort to save them from a watery grave.

Gallagher assisted in bringing the wounded from the interior of the vessel. In the lower forward compartment, where the shell had struck the dead and injured were floating around in from three to eight feet of water. Two nurses were up to their waists attempting to rescue a few.

The ship sank shortly after the men left this section of the boat. Lieutenant Gallagher is on his way south, speaking at numerous towns along the way. He started out with Private Mike O'Rourke.

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**General Pan Will Head Mission to Australians**

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 19.—General Paul Gerald Pan, through the French embassy at Washington was appointed today as head of the French mission to Australia, in succession to the late Albert Metin, who died in this city last week. Members of the mission announced today. M. Andre Siegfried, who was the general secretary of the mission under M. Metin, was advanced to the post

of assistant to General Pan. M. Siegfried is a writer and doctor of the University of Paris. The mission expects to leave for Australia within the near future. M. Thomsen, a member of the mission, will accompany the body of the late M. Metin to New York, whence it will be taken on a United States warship to France.

## American Citizen Would Be Rid of German Name

Claiming that a German name has made a family of genuine, native-born American citizens scorned and persecuted, John W. Schwabauer and his wife, Mary Anna Schwabauer, of Aurora, have petitioned the county court to permit them to anglicize the cognomen, making it Bowers. The appeal states because of the Teuton name the children were shunned at school and Mr. Schwabauer encountered difficulty in obtaining employment.

## Another Exempted Month Declared by Commission

September has been declared by the state industrial accident commission as an exempted month in which no payments into the fund will be required from employers or employees. Payments for the month were they collected, would aggregate about \$350,000. February and July were also declared exempted months. Thus a record of three exempted months for the year is established. Payments for the three months would have totaled about \$750,000. The commission's policy not to ac-

quire a surplus of more than 30 per cent over and above liabilities makes it possible to declare exemptions for some months.
