### WOULD COMBINE TWO HEARINGS

#### Service Commission Suggests Supplementary Case on Diversions

Because the express rate hearing which is to be conducted in Portland September 29 by Clyde B. Aitchison of the interstate commerce commission, and the reconignment and diversion case which is slated for a hearing in Chicago September 4 have many issues in common, the Oregon public service commission suggests that a supplementary hearing of the latter be held in Portland on the date fixed for the express rate hearing.

The commission makes this suggestion in a letter to George B. McGinty, secretary of the interstate commerce commission, pointing out that the supplementary hearing at Portland, while Mr. Aitchison is in the west, would make it possible for interested men of the Northwest to attend, many of whom would be unable to attend the hearing at Chicago.

Under the federal railroad administration a charge ranging from \$2 to \$5 a car is proposed for diversion of cars of freight before they reach their original destinations or for reconignment to other points after they have reached their original destinations. A general protest has been made.

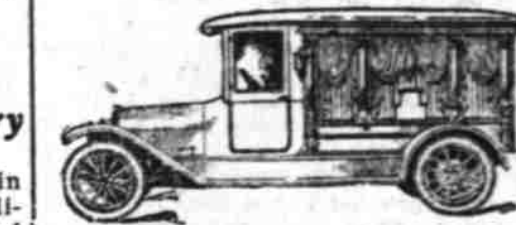
### Proposed Harney County Project Costs \$225,000

A proposed irrigation project in Harney county to cost an estimated \$225,000 is involved in applications filed with State Engineer Lewis by C. B. McConnell of Burns for the Harney basin development company. An appropriation of 165 second-feet of water from the Blitzen river and 306 second-feet from the Silvies river for irrigation of lands in the bed of Malheur lake and lands adjoining is asked. The applications are filed in connection with an application submitted some time ago to the state land board for reclamation by drainage of the bed of Malheur Lake.

The project, according to the applications filed, will involve an area of 5,000 acres, a large part of which now lies in the bed of Malheur lake which will be irrigated through construction of canals from Blitzen and Silvies rivers.

### Contractors Fall Down and State Finishes Work

The state will complete the construct-Leona section of the Pacific highway in Douglas county, State Highway Engineer Nunn announced yesterday, because of financial troubles that have been encountered by Hall & Soien, the contractors who were awarded the work. The estimated cost of the project is \$58,000, the stretch being more than 4 miles of grading and macadam. The project is 35 per cent completed. The equipment of the contractors will be taken over by the state.
