PRICES HITTING LOWEST MARKS
Chicago Board of Trade Offerings Take Heavy Slump To Cellar

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—There might have been an air raid over the board of trade today from the way prices took to the cellar. Corn dropped 3 1/2 @ 4c; oats 3/4 @ 3/8c, and provisions 17 1/2 to 35c.

In corn bearishness was practically unanimous. Such support as there was came from resting orders until covered by the slump and against bids. These caused a comparatively slight rally toward the end but most of it was lost. October closed 1 1/2c under yesterday at \$1.58 1/2.

Hedging pressure, increasing receipts and primarily the corn weakness, accounted for the decline in the oats market. Cash houses bought September and sold October at a spread of 1 1/2c at one time, shipping and export demand was slow and the arrivals included some Indiana and other corn usually shipped east. October oats closed 3/8c down at 72 1/2c.

Provisions trade was small and there was nothing to oppose the bearish influence of the decline in corn. Pork closed 45 @ 55c lower; lard 17 1/2c lower, and ribs 22 1/2 @ 35c down.

MONEY OUTLOOK NOW IMPROVES
Federal Reserve Board's Warning of Last Month Has an Effect

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Stocks were slightly more susceptible to favorable developments today, though among the unusual favorites were irregularly reduced before the close. A more hopeful feeling prevailed as to money prospects, regardless of renewal by the federal reserve board of last month's warning concerning the urgent need of credit conservation.

Reports from Washington pointed to early adjustment of the railroad contract dispute, investment rails evidently anticipating this outcome by their firmness.

Canadian Pacific, in no way concerned in the differences of the transportation systems with the federal government, enjoyed another upward spurt, though not attaining its high record of last week.

United States Steel rose to the year's best at 115 1/2, an extreme advance of two points from its minimum of the forenoon. But half of this advance was forfeited in the final hour.

Dr. MacKenzie of Portland Appointed to Conference

Dr. A. J. MacKenzie of Portland was yesterday appointed by Governor Withycombe to attend a convention of the American Academy of Political and Social Science in Philadelphia September 20 and 21. The conference will be of four sessions devoted to the rehabilitation of the wounded soldiers. Governor Withycombe was requested by Carl Kelley, acting president of the academy, to make an appointment from Oregon.

Three German statesmen, so a Swiss newspaper hears, are to fire a peace volley. But if they want to command attention numbers are not so important as what they say.
