SCHEDULE OF LOCAL PRICES AS ARRANGED BY FEDERAL COMMITTEE

Instead of having daily changes in current market figures in Salem, the same prices will hereafter be in effect for the period of a week. The local government price-fixing board for the first time Tuesday afternoon and prepared the list which is being published today. It will be in force until next Thursday, although the board meets again on Tuesday to make changes in the schedule.

Preparation of the figures occupied an entire afternoon. Some difficulty was encountered in fixing the price of onions and beans but otherwise the business went smoothly. The retail prices being based on the percentage established by the government. The rates are practically the same as the current ones in Portland.

The price fixing board is composed of W. T. Jenks, representing the wholesalers; Ed Schuake, it and delivery; J. McDonald, farmer; Mrs. H. C. Fletcher, grocer; M. A. Austen, stores of Woodburn; Mrs. E. Hofer, publicist. Fred Chapman, manager of the Commercial club, acted as chairman.
