SALEM SOLDIERS GO OVER PARIS

Rouch Tells About It—George Watson Located With "Y" in Gay City

Corporal E. N. Rouch, brother of Lieutenant Cloyd Rouch, one of whose letters from France was published in The Statesman several days ago, has just written home of his celebration of the Fourth of July with Company M near Paris. His letter follows in part:

"This is Sunday and also the French day of national celebration, but because of the day they are naturally not celebrating as much as they would if it were any other day of the week. I guess they are having a good time in Paris, though.

"It has been some time since I have written because things have been happening so fast in the past two or three weeks. Some of these might interest you, for they affect us greatly, but they would be cut out, so I won't attempt to tell them.

"The Fourth here was a great day all over France. In Paris there was a celebration which they say couldn't be beaten any place in the United States. I wish I could have seen it. But here we had a big parade and review by the colonel and some of the French officers and citizens of importance. In the afternoon a field meet and in the evening fireworks, so all we missed was the pink lemonade and hot-dog stands and merry-go-round. The Y.M.C.A. helped to make that up by conducting a free light drinks counter.

"But it isn't the Fourth that lingers in my memory. Since then I took a trip up to the front within sound of the big guns and on the way back had three nights and two days in Paris. That was some stay, too, giving us a chance to cover the town fairly well without going into the finer details. The first night there, you can't imagine what we did. Just try to guess, before you read on.

"We took our rooms in the Hotel Pavillon, which is the Y.M.C.A. enlisted men's hotel and a dandy, too. Well, the first thing we did prompted by two sleepless nights and a trip in one of those 'Hommes 40 Chevaux' was to take a big bath in a tub ten feet long—one at a time, too—eat a still bigger meal of neither the mess-geant's nor the Frenchman's style, and then hit the hay for, oh, excuse me, we went to bed on a real feather bed—one of the kind you use a ladder to get into—and we slept for 12 long hours of the best sleep God ever gave a Yank in France. And that in Paris, too, with all kinds of things going on, including wild women, who speak English. But why should we worry? We still had two extra nights and days.

"Well, I knew nothing till one of the bunch came tearing into the room and wanted to know why in blazes we didn't get up and go down for dinner. My bed mate was Sergeant Hansen or 'Scoop.' We thought it over for half an hour or so, as best we could, with several more who had come in, grabbing at feet protruding or chewing on our ears, etc. But we finally got up courage to jump down and take our time pulling our, du, du, du, with thoughts of reveille as far away in our heads as the end of the war.

"After dinner the Y. M. sightseeing trip being full up, we decided to go out to Versailles, so after a short trip on 'submarines' and electric cars as good as you see in New York, we found ourselves at the old chateau of Versailles and we spent the whole afternoon there and wished we could have seen more. We didn't get out as far as the Trianons. That takes a day itself, and we look to that day with grand hopes as impossible as it seems now, for remember these two times I have been there are only accidents pure and simple. Not many fellows are as fortunate, besides the comparatively few whose work takes them there. But to go back, the things we saw are better described by the post cards and guide books I am sending.

"This place was built by Louis XIII and XIV and I must say they had some grand ideas.

"That night we went to the Folies Bergeres, a theatre in the gay city. We with some Y. M. men who had just come over.

"I mustn't forget too that as we were eating dinner I was just remarking that we ought to find out where in France Mr. Watson is. No more than 10 minutes later who should walk over to our table than that gentleman himself, saying he had heard and recognized Scoop's voice. We had a 'grande parley,' but he is so busy at headquarters he couldn't find time to see the town with us. He is in Paris all the time.

"The next day we took the Y. M. sightseeing trip, saw the Notre Dame cathedral with the results of the big range shell, which killed and wounded so many people, the Bois de Boulogne, the Eiffel Tower, now used for radio work, the Invalides with its museum of captured guns and aeroplanes, the Pont de Alexander III, a beautiful thing, the Grance Palace, Place de la Concorde, Church of the Marelle, the Opera, the Louvre and gardens, the Hotel de Ville or city hall and the Hall of Justice, the same as our supreme court. It was a great treat and well worth the money. I forgot to mention the Bastille. There is nothing left there now but a statue erected in memory of the fall of the fortress and the marks on the sidewalk where the prison used to stand.

"That afternoon we wandered around town seeing things which had interested us more than anything else. After supper another theatre then to bed. The next morning we had to leave and now are at the same dope again."

GOVERNMENT SEIZES BIG MARINE BASE

Plant at St. Thomas in Danish West Indies Taken by Alien Custodian

POSSIBLE NAVAL BASE

Germany Considered That the Place Admitted of Such Possibilities

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—In announcing seizure of the marine plant, which is located at St. Thomas, alien property custodian Palmer said that Germany considered that it admitted of possibilities as a naval base, "was shown by the fact that their principal building commanding the harbor is of reinforced concrete and the plaza in front of it is said to have an eight-foot foundation of concrete, fit for gun emplacements."

After the United States acquired the island from Denmark, and when it appeared that it would declare war on Germany, Mr. Palmer said, the Hamburg American line agent, who also was the German consulate "sold" the plant to the line's Danish lawyer, a Danish citizen named Jorgensen. The sole consideration mentioned was a note for \$210,000 which Jorgensen was said to have given the German company. This note was payable three months after date, and renewable every three months until after the war and bore no interest, Mr. Palmer said.

Darwin O. Curry, the alien property custodian's representative at St. Thomas learned of the fact that Jorgensen and Jorgensen finally executed a deed to the alien property custodian, but not, Mr. Palmer said, until after he had protested and sought refuge in his Danish citizenship. The alien property custodian assumed whatever obligations were attached to the note Jorgensen had given the German company and the note itself was seized.

One of the reasons for the purchase of the Danish West Indies by the United States was the fact that St. Thomas offered a natural base for the defense of the Panama canal and it is the intention of the government to fortify the harbor and establish a naval station there.

STIRRING DUEL HELD ON TRACK

Lu Princeton Takes Thrilling Trot at Grand Circuit Syracuse Meet

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Sept. 12.—Lu Princeton, Walter Cox's sensational trotter, won a stirring duel from St. Frisco, driven by E. F. Geers, in the free for all trot that featured the third day of the grand circuit race meet here this afternoon. Best time 2:06 1-4.

Cox lost by a nose in the opening heat, after a thrilling dash to the wire in the second he came from a nap behind at the start to win by a head, after a brilliant drive from the three quarters mark. Lu Princeton never was headed in the final heat and won by two lengths.

Harvey Ernest, formerly of this city, won in 2:08 3-4, a popular victory, with Ima Jay in the governor's stake for \$500.

The field of eight gave Starter Fred A. Upton considerable trouble in the third heat, and after repeated warnings he fined Cox, Murphy, Rodney and Wright \$50 each. The field got away to a splendid start after the punishment.

In the opening event on the card, a 2:13 class trot, Murphy won first money with Petrex in 2:13 1-4 in straight heats and with little opposition. A rain during the morning delayed the start of the race until 4 o'clock and one of the events was put over until tomorrow.

The new barracks will be financed through the organization of the university barracks corporation, as the university at present has no fund that can be used to erect the necessary buildings for quarters for the soldiers.

BANK CONTROLS W. S. S. SALES

Federal Reserve Organization Called On to Handle Baby Bond Sale

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 12.—The work of thrift stamps savings organizations in the twelfth federal reserve bank district has been brought under the control of the federal reserve bank with the object of bringing about closer co-ordination of liberty loan and thrift stamp work. It was announced here tonight at the conclusion of a meeting of state thrift stamp committee directors with James K. Lynch, governor of the reserve bank.

A resolution was adopted calling upon the public to invest the interest coupons of the third liberty loan, due September 15, in thrift stamps. Another resolution which was adopted called upon each state thrift stamp director to confer with the liberty

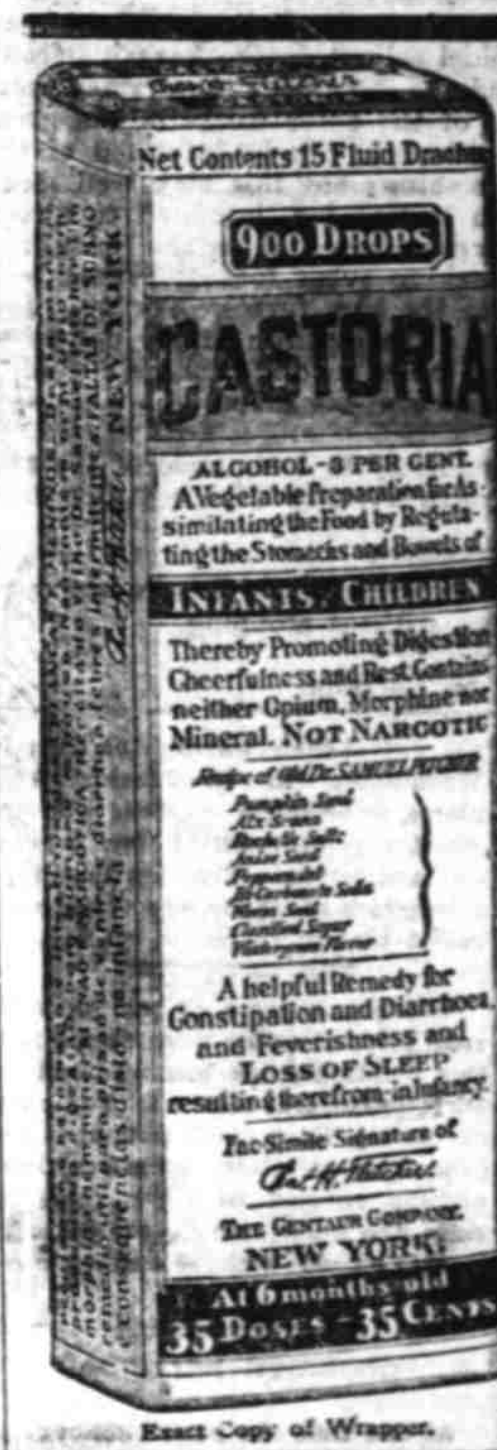
Cubs Divide Pot Among Men Who Enter Service
