SALEM MEN ARE IN BIG FIGHT
Several Boys Wounded and One Expected to Be Home for Thanksgiving
Yesterday's casualty list, printed today in the Statesman, contains the name of Leon L. Hanson of Salem as missing in action. This, however, is erroneous, according to a letter R. P. Hanson, 180 Miller street, has received from his son. Private Hanson is in a hospital suffering from a shrapnel wound in the leg, and that the wound is a severe one is indicated by a remark in the letter that he expects to be home for the Thanksgiving dinner.

Several Salem men are among recent casualties. The names of Frank Durbin Jr. and Dave A. Swaggerty already have been published as wounded. Durbin also has a shrapnel wound in the leg. Another whose name was published yesterday is Lane Noel Davis, grandson of Enos Presnall, who was wounded in the leg and near the eye by shrapnel.

AUTO WRECK KILLS TWO.
KELLOGG, Ida, Sept. 12.—Oscar Anders and Ole Bye were killed and Jack Edwards, J. A. Vandever and a third man unidentified, were seriously injured this evening when an automobile stage in which they were riding to Wallace left the road near here in an effort to pass another machine. The driver of the stage was unhurt. All were from Kellogg.

DISTRICTS TO BE CANVASSED FOR ARMY FUND

Salvationist War Money To Be Gathered in Coffee Pots by Salem Women

ASSIGNMENTS ARE MADE

Careful Records To Be Kept—Boys Over There Like the Doughnuts

Coffee pots passed around by an ukelele brigade on the principal downtown streets next Thursday and Saturday afternoons are expected to swell the Salvation army war service fund. This is just one of the devices by which the Salem women in charge of the drive hope to divert small change into this channel and put the city over the top in little more than a day.

All preliminary plans have been completed by Mrs. John Carson and committees from the Salem Woman's club are prepared to canvass the entire city next Tuesday. Men are asked to leave their donations at home, as down town stores will not be invaded and no effort made to disturb business. Careful record will be kept of every gift of money, so dodging cannot be accomplished gracefully.

A group of Willamette university women under the direction of Mrs. George H. Alden will take charge of the street solicitation. Dan Langenburg has agreed to supply a group of girls with ukeleles who will furnish music on the principal corners in order to draw a crowd. The college girls will then go about among the spectators with coffee pots and collect. They are to be dressed in the costumes of the allied nations.

The drive actually begins Sunday with sermons on the work of the Salvation army in all churches.

In writing home to their parents numerous Salem boys have mentioned the good the organization is doing at the front. For example, Allan G. Carson recently wrote home the following:

"I am thankful to say my mother is doing all she can for the Red Cross, but, mother, try to do something for the Salvation army. These people are doing wonderful work behind the lines with their coffee and doughnuts, many times in great danger of losing their lives."

Mrs. Alden and Mrs. A. A. Lee have also received similar letters from their sons in France.

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 12.—That Germany might restore Belgium without conditions or indemnities in case no other country would be better situated as regards Belgium than Germany was the belief expressed today by Frederick von Payer, the imperial vice chancellor of Germany in a speech delivered at Stuttgart.
