full list of names to be secured so the invitation has also been extended to those who were not reached in this manner, as they are equally as welcome to march.

The tentative plan for the procession divides it into five sections, the mothers first, then wives, sisters, daughters and last, those who have no relatives in army or navy. Possibly there will also be some special features. The women who are entitled to have service flags in their homes are asked to carry these. The other patriotic women should have small American flags.

The marchers will gather at the court house square, going from there west on Court to Commercial, south on Commercial to State and east on State to the park. A short line of march and short program have been arranged so that the women will have little opportunity to get tired. As marching parades are considered more patriotic at this time, very if any, automobiles will be in line. The Oregon Guard companies will probably be given a part in the event.

Edward Cookingham, liberty loan executive chairman for Oregon has issued the following proclamation with reference to the loan campaign in the state.

"The pre-campaign pledge period for liberty loan subscriptions opens throughout Oregon Monday, September 16 and in Portland on Wednesday, September 18, Oregon's full quota should be pledged before September 28, the opening day of the official soliciting campaign. Every person who pledges himself to subscribe for his full quota as set by his rating committee and files his application with his liberty loan committee will be presented with a ribbon bearing the words, 'I am pledged.' This insignia of honor should

be worn by all who pledge their subscriptions during the entire pre-campaign pledge period, but in no case should the official fourth liberty loan subscriber's button be worn until September 28."
