INFLUENZA IS ON THE SPREAD
Five More Army Camps Reported to Be Hit by Disease, Including Lewis

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—The outbreak of Spanish influenza at five additional army camps was announced tonight by Surgeon General Gorgas, making a total of nine camps in which the disease has been discovered.

The number of cases reported from all camps up to noon today was 2,312, with 11 deaths. The greatest number of cases, 4,591, was reported from Camp Devens, Mass., while Camp Lee, Va., had 1,311 and Camp Upton, N. Y., 602. Camp Devens also reported 45 new cases of pneumonia, which medical officers believe resulted from the influenza epidemic.

The camps included in tonight's announcement with the number of cases at each camp were: Camp Gordon, Ga., 128; Camp Syracuse, N. Y., 64; Camp Humphreys, Va., 54; Camp Merritt, N. J., 182; and Camp Lewis, Wash., 11.

In response from a request from Surgeon General Gorgas of the public health service, health authorities in many states sent word today as to the development of the epidemic. Two camps with influenza aboard were quarantined at Newport News, and in all parts of the country steps were taken by health officers to check the spread of the disease.

BETTER TONE TO STOCK MARKETS
War and Peace Stocks Respond Alike to Upward Tugging That Develops

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Substantial improvement in both tone and prices, together with an increased volume in trading, created a distinct change in the stock market today as compared with yesterday's listless session. Vigorous buying, inaugurated at the opening with stocks and equipments as leaders, continued almost without interruption except for fractional profit taking during the final hour, and the closing was firm with prices showing advances of one to three points in many instances.

The issues commonly called war and peace stocks responded alike to the upward tugging, although in some instances the improvement was attributed to special influences. United States steel's rise of 1 1/2 points to 110 1/2, a new high since the current upward movement began, was associated with expectations in some quarters that general higher trade prices would be granted by the government, and sharp advances in equipments such as Baldwin Locomotive and American Car, with anticipation of large new contracts.

Such issues as shippings and oils played secondary roles. The sales amounted to 215,000 shares. Recessions in Liberty 4s and 4 1/2s were ascribed to preparations to subscribe to the forthcoming new loan and similar influences were responsible for the scaling down in values of the general bond list. Total sales par value were \$4,400,000.

Foreign issues made further headway in spots. Paris 5s touched 96, the highest in a long time. Foreign exchange rates were well maintained aside from Swiss bills, which has reached new low figures for the present movement.

United States bonds, old issues, were unchanged on call.
