Several kilometers to north of the Handzeem-Cortemmark, reached yesterday. In the center the French have taken the plateau of Hoogdele, Gits and Gitsberg.

"French cavalry have crossed the Roulers-Thourout road and are advancing toward Lychtervelde. The Franco-British troops have captured Winckelhoeke and Lendelede and reached the Courtrai-Inghelunster railway.

"The French and Belgians have taken 7000 prisoners and 80 guns."

PARIS, Oct. 15.—(Havas)—Summing up the situation on the British front the Echo de Paris says that Douai virtually has been taken, that

Valenciennes is threatened and Denain only a few kilometers distant. To give an idea of the German losses in Champagne the Petit Parisien quotes the evidence of an enemy prisoner who said that the 106th Infantry regiment while engaged in battle on October 4 was decimated. The companies in two battalions, according to the prisoner, were reduced to 30 men and two other supporting battalions suffered heavily from artillery and airplanes. Despite these losses, the prisoner said, the regiment was ordered to counter attack.

LONDON, Oct. 15.—The independent air force today bombed the Frencaty airfield and blew up a Zeppelin shed, according to an announcement tonight.

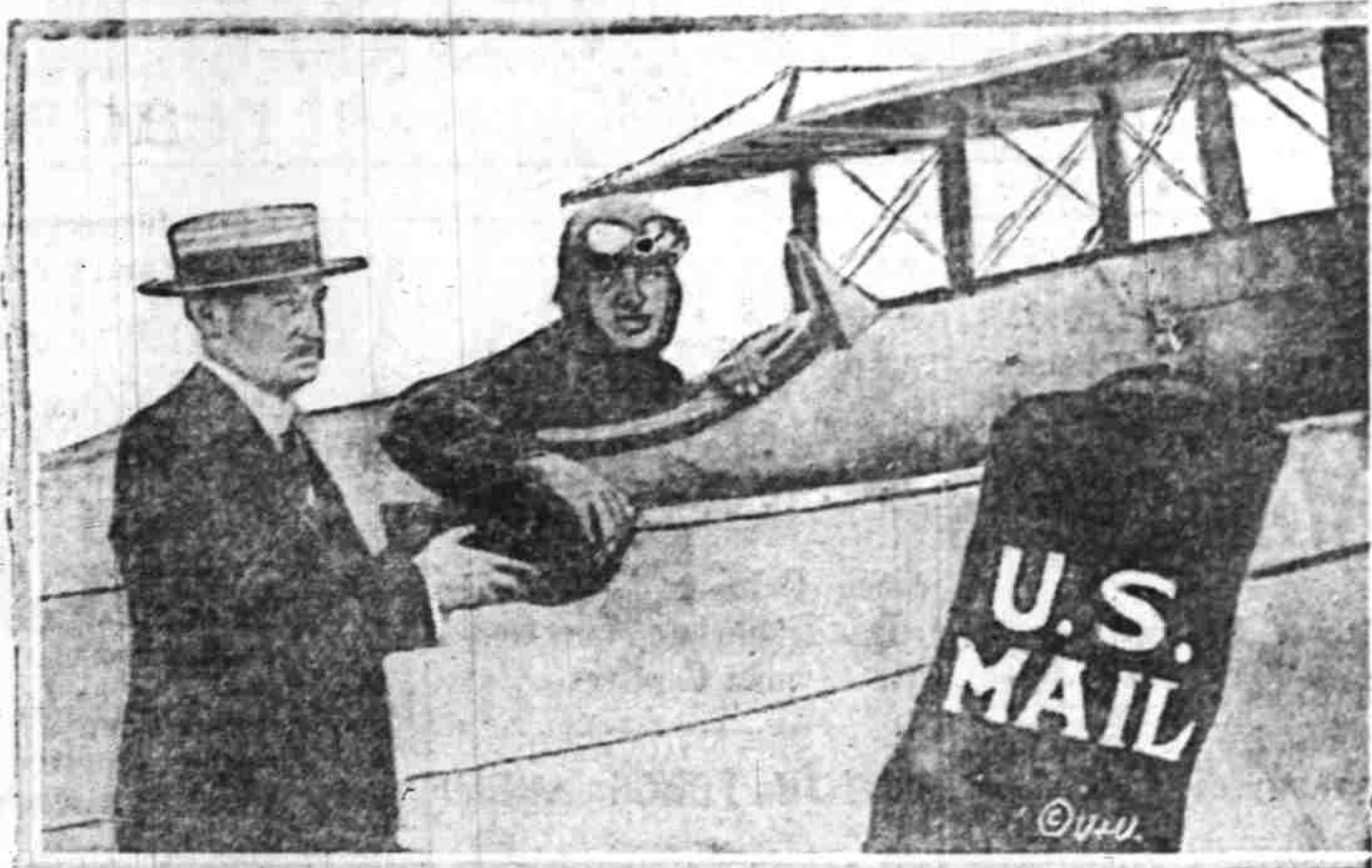
PARIS, Monday, Oct. 14.—The full text of the official statement issued by the war office tonight fol-

lows: "Local operations enabled us to better our position on the left bank of the Oise in the region of Mont d'Origny. South of the Serre we occupied Monceau-les-Leups. We have reached one kilometer south of Assis-sur-Serre.

"With the co-operation of Italian troops we took and passed Sissonne, more to the east. In spite of very stubborn resistance by the enemy we have greatly progressed on the north bank of the Aisne. We have advanced our lines past the villages of La Malmaison, Lor, Le Thour and St. Germainmont. In the region of Asfeld we have crossed the Aisne at several points north of Bligny.

"Eastern front, Oct. 15.—Serbian troops, supported by the allies, continue to liberate their territory. Greek forces are taking part in the operations. The Serbians continue the occupation of Eastern Macedonia

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INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC IN ALL THE STATES (Continued from page 1).

Oklahoma and Arkansas.

In war-crowded District of Columbia the epidemic continues unabated. As a further precautionary measure, the treasury and interior departments today issued orders that no new employees of those departments be brought to Washington until further notice.

The fuel administration, at the suggestion of the public health service, also announced today that as far as possible all engagements and appointments for conference with out-of-town persons during the next two weeks will be cancelled.

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—The state fuel administration today issued orders to all apartment houses that, in view of the influenza epidemic, all apartment houses must be kept warm enough to insure comfort to the tenants.

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—Two deaths from pneumonia and about 75 additional cases of Spanish influenza today made the situation in Portland more critical. Health officials made no attempt to minimize the seriousness of the situation tonight. Today's reports bring the total number of cases in the city to 386 with an estimate of 500 actual cases by City Health Officer Parrish. On account of the crowded condition of the hospitals efforts are being made by Mayor George L. Baker and Dr. Parrish to secure a large building to be used as a municipal hospital. At the Benson Polytechnic school the situation has improved through many of the soldiers still are ill. A grave shortage of nurses is being experienced.

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 15.—Spanish influenza affected every school in the state of Washington today when Secretary O. C. Whitney of Tacoma, announced that the meeting of the Washington Educational association, scheduled to take place in Seattle October 22 to 26, had been postponed for that reason. It will probably be held during the Christmas or spring holidays, the secretary stated, the definite date to be announced later through the press.

Oregon Has 97 Per Cent of Its Quota in Banks

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 15.—The Twelfth Federal Reserve bank district up to tonight had subscribed \$241,330,350, or 97 per cent of its quota in the fourth liberty loan. Alaska and Hawaii reported their respective subscriptions had carried them "over the top."

The standing of the divisions in the Twelfth federal reserve bank district, according to subscriptions actually in bank was announced tonight as follows:

Oregon, 97 per cent; Washington, 71 per cent; Arizona, 61 per cent, and Nevada, 47 per cent. Washington led in the number of honor flags awarded. The total number of subscribers in the district was 1,099,182 as compared with a total of 1,372,585 for the entire campaign of the third liberty loan.

H. L. Clark Is Candidate to Take Court House Job

Up around Stayton it has leaked out that H. L. Clark of Salem is an independent candidate for county judge in opposition to Judge Bushey. Mr. Clark has succeeded in keeping his candidacy pretty much on the Q. T. around Salem, but things like that will come out. Mr. Clark is chairman of the Salem school board.

LOS ANGELES STRICKEN.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 15.—Orchestra concerts, cabaret entertainments and any other attraction that might serve to draw or hold a crowd, were placed under the ban by a board of health precaution issued here today as a further precaution against the spread of influenza. The board had previously ordered the closing of theaters, moving picture houses, schools and churches.

Brisbane Probe Develops General German Inquiry

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Investigation by the senate judiciary subcommittee into the purchase of the Washington Times by Arthur Brisbane with the aid of money advanced by brewers very likely will develop into a general inquiry into the activities of German propagandists in this country.

This was indicated tonight by members of the committee after information obtained by the army intelligence service had been submitted to the committee in executive session. Senators declined to discuss the information, but announcement was made that Captain G. B. Lester of the army intelligence service had been subpoenaed to appear next Tuesday when the inquiry will begin. It also was understood that George Creel, chairman of the committee on public information, would be called.

In further preparation for a general inquiry, the committee has asked E. Lowry Humes, former federal district attorney at Pittsburg, to furnish the committee with a digest of information secured by the government as to the political activities of brewers, as revealed by federal grand jury investigations at Pittsburg, while a similar request also was sent to B. F. Looney, attorney general of Texas.

A. Mitchell Palmer, alien property custodian, whose charges made in a speech in Harrisburg, Pa., resulted in these senate ordering the investigation, appeared before the committee today, but opening of the hearings was postponed because of the illness of Alexander Konta of New York, the principal witness.

Absolute Americanism Demand of Roosevelt

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—The two immediate duties before the United States, Colonel Theodore Roosevelt tonight told the Liederkreis Club of New York, are to carry on the war "until we win the peace of overwhelming victory" and to insist on absolute Americanism in the citizenship of the United States.

Peace not based on the unconditional surrender of Germany and her vassal allies should be accepted, he declared. On the other hand, he asserted that it was a "gross infamy" and disloyal to the true spirit of Americanism, to discriminate against any American because of foreign birth or ancestry.

Speaking in behalf of the fourth liberty loan, Colonel Roosevelt urged the club to support buying bonds. Its 200 members now in the service, he paid high tribute to the men of German blood who have fought for American ideals, and continued:

"If I had been allowed to raise the division for service in France which congress authorized me to raise, I should have made a point of having the largest possible proportion of men of German origin among my troops, and I should have been glad to have served under a major general such as Kahn. If you look at the casualty lists you will see what a large percentage of the names indicate that the bearers were of German blood. This war is indeed the crucible, and in the actual test of battle it is showing that Americanism is matter of spirit and purpose and soul, and not of birthright or descent."

REORGANIZE HOME GUARD.

SEATTLE, Oct. 15.—Washington's recently formed home guard regiment has been given federal recognition as the Third Washington National Guard Infantry regiment. Word to this effect was received today by Brigadier General Harvey J. Moss, state adjutant general, from Brigadier General John W. Heaver, chief of the militia bureau at Washington. The strength of the regiment is 1650 men and 54 officers.

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
