"Peace prospects, though distant, have brought about a remarkable change of undertone in the security markets."

"Distrust has given way to widespread optimism."

"There has already been an advance of 10 to 20 points in the better class of railroads and industrials; but even these figures do not represent any inflation; for prices are still substantially below the high points of 1916."

"We are already in a new era, AND PLANS FOR DEMOBILIZATION ARE BEING RAPIDLY MADE."

"What the future will bring forth cannot be foreseen at this time, though undoubtedly a considerable measure of Government regulation of trade will be retained."

The above paragraphs are taken from the current weekly financial letter of Henry Clews, the Wall Street authority.

The time when peace will come is already being discounted largely by the far-seeing leading financiers of the United States.

They will be ready to do their part in bringing the great commercial and manufacturing interests of the country comparatively undisturbed from a war to a peace basis.

The United States is now making battle planes faster than they can be shipped to France. Uncle Sam has only "just begun to fight," in full and effective measure. What she will be able to do to Germany if that country does not end the war quickly will make the great things already accomplished appear small and insignificant.

The new members of the two houses of Congress to be elected next Tuesday will not take office till next March. In the mean time, this war will have become history—unless the reports now coming out of Germany are widely at variance with the facts.

The "flash" that the Versailles conference has decided may come at any moment now. Then the war may come to a close with a bang. Or it may go on a little longer, till Germany caves in utterly.

JACKSON SCHEME IS REPUDIATED

Sam Jackson, self-appointed guardian of the public weal, has decreed through the columns of the Portland Journal, that the delinquent tax publication law and statute defining legal rates, shall be cast to the discard at the coming election. This is in effect the mandate published each day in the Journal, and in place of the present statutes, Mr. Jackson will "substitute" a couple of pet measures of his own.

The citizens of Oregon, as a consequence are debating on whether they should follow Mr. Jackson's injunction, or whether it would be safe to figure out their voting privilege in accordance with mandates of their own consciences. If they are at all hesitant to comply with the Jackson edict, it is probably because they realize Mr. Jackson is an old friend at telling folks how to cast their ballots and that his desires in the matter do not always coincide with the views of the citizens. This was notably the case a few years ago when Mr. Jackson attempted to foist off single tax on Oregon.

The two measures in question are now being considered by the voters of the state, and it seems to be the well defined consensus of opinion in every section, that the present laws are equitable. It is further conceded that the delinquent tax law is more than mere administrative law in that it specifically renders a public service which cannot be overlooked by any fair minded citizen—and the taxpayer in particular.

HUGHES JOINS IN ATTACK ON WILSON STAND

Deplores President's Recent Appeal for Democratic Congressman.

PARTISAN IS ASSAILED

Declares that "No Political Party is Paramount in Patriotism."

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—Calling for national unity "after the methods of a republic and not an autocracy," and deploring President Wilson's assumption that only the return to congress of a Democratic majority would uphold its national leadership, Charles E. Hughes declared in an address here tonight that bi-partisan support alone "would save the president from the lesser dignity and influence of a mere party leadership."

Speaking at a Republican rally at the Union League club, Mr. Hughes declared that "no political party was paramount in patriotism" and that Republicans had a right to express their political preferences.

"Must we Republicans," he declared, "patriotically toil and give without seeking a voice in the national assembly, yielding our representation to Democrats, not as more worthy or more loyal, not as more sacrificing or more intelligent, but to Democrats as such, simply because they are Democrats."

After declaring the issue was transcendent, Mr. Hughes emphasized the need for complete victory in the war, the crushing of arbitrary and tyrannical power and the dawn of the new era of peace and justice.

"Did I not think that the Republican party would, through its representatives, aid in the efficient conduct of this war and in the settlement of a righteous peace, I would leave the party. It is because I believe the Republican party is an important and necessary agency in the

Jackson's law would abolish the publication altogether, and leave the delinquent at the mercy of the tax title grabber. Such is the practical working of the Jackson amendment. His other bill is to cut down the present legal rate of five cents per line—now in force in practically every state in the union.

Unfortunately for Mr. Jackson the voters of the state are able to reason things out for themselves. They love suggestions but not mandates as to how they are to cast their ballots.

For weeks Jackson's Journal has been giving orders to the Oregon electorate on the Jackson pet measures. Strange to relate, however, the Portland Chamber of Commerce, at its weekly luncheon this week, unanimously turned down both of the schemes. They evidently figured that there was no justifiable reason at this time for punishing either the taxpayers or the press, so they went on receipt as unqualifiedly rejecting the Jackson bills.

It must have been a sorry day for Mr. Jackson and his Portland Journal, when "the home town" folks turned against him. Incidentally no mention of the action was made in the Journal.
