CHICAGO, Oct. 31 .- Month-end adjustment of trades did a good deal to make the corn market average higher today despite news of the formal surrender of Turkey. Prices closed unsettled, at 1c net decline to 2 %c advance, with November \$1.18 to \$1.18 1/4 and December \$1.16 3/4 to \$1.17. Oats gained 1c to 11/2c and provisions finished irregular, \$1 off

to \$1.25 up. .Uncertainty in regard to armistice conditions for Germany led to numerous bulges and breaks in the value of corn, but the price changes were kept within a narrower range than of late and the upward tendency of the market became more pronounced.
