SHARP SETBACK MET BY CORN
Bearish Estimates and Peace News Are Contributing Causes of Drop.

CHICAGO, Nov. 1. - Bearish crop estimates together with the capitulation of Turkey and the breakdown of Austria forced a sharp setback today in the price of corn. The market closed unsettled, 2 1/2c to 4 1/2c lower, with December \$1.12 1/2 to \$1.13 and January \$1.15 to \$1.15 1/2. Oats finished 3/4c to 2 1/2c down, and provisions up 5c to 60c.

Lowest quotations of the day in corn came after the issuance of an authoritative statement indicating that the yield of corn this season would be nearly 100,000,000 bushels in excess of the government estimate a month ago.

Long before the announcement of crop figures today, however, the bears had decidedly the advantage owing to the fact that all of Germany's allies had quit. Such news from abroad, though, seemed to have been looked for by a majority of traders, and to have been for the most part discounted as a market factor.

Oats descended with corn. Stabilizing of the hog market lifted provisions.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1. - Wall street today registered its further conviction in an early cessation of the world conflict by renewed buying of various issues commonly designated as peace stocks, whereas war stocks and related shares were heavy under constant pressure.

The market's professional or speculative character was demonstrated anew, however, by the many declines of the last hour, when Mexican Petroleum forfeited all its gain of 10 1/2 points and other leaders reacted one to two points.

This reversal was the more inexplicable from the fact that it synchronized with a drop in call money from 8 to 4 per cent, the lowest rate for that form of accommodation in almost three months.

United States Steel was again the pivot around which the day's activities revolved, its extreme decline of two points being only slightly retried at the end.

Trading in rails at gross gains of one to two and a half points was noteworthy for the wide variety of issues which were in demand, including low grade or secondary shares of the western and southwestern groups. Shipping, metals, motors and tobacco contributed measurably to the day's turnover at advances of one to four points.

Sales amounted to \$25,000 shares. Bonds, especially rails and internationals, were strong, liberty issues ruling steady. Total sales, par value, aggregated \$7,500,000.

Old United States bonds were unchanged on call.

SEES ENDING OF WORLD CONFLICT
Wall Street Registers Its Further Conviction of a Speedy Close.

LIKENS PRESIDENT'S VISION OF GOVERNMENT TO THAT OF HOHENZOLLERN.

PORTSMOUTH, N.H., Nov. 1 - Former President Taft urged New Hampshire voters in a speech here tonight to elect Republicans to congress so that President Wilson would be held to an unconditional surrender to Germany and not be allowed to make a peace by negotiations.

Mr. Taft objected to the president's appeal for the election of Democratic candidates for congress on the assumption that a Democratic majority in both houses would make the president the unembarrassed spokesman in affairs at home and abroad.

"The character of the president's appeal," said Mr. Taft, "discloses his utter misunderstanding of our constitutional form of government. The appeal is a demand for power during the next two years equal to that of the Hohenzollerns in war and reconstruction, and accounting for the American people to entrust him with unlimited control over the settlement of a peace that will affect them for a century when he has given many evidences of a wish to pursue a course against which their faces are set like flint, to-wit, peace by negotiation. His appeal for unrestrained power is unprecedented in the annals of the country, and it is as unreplicable as it is unnecessary."

TAFT DECLARES WILSON PLEA IS AUTOCRATIC ONE
