Sale Causes Dispute—Alleging that Hubbert, Susie and Theodore Gillhouse sold vehicles and implements belonging to a farm on which they were renting from him, Middy Robbins yesterday filed a complaint in the circuit court asking for foreclosure of a \$1600 mortgage held by the defendants. When the family prepared to move away, he alleges they sold personal property belonging to him before he could come west from Missouri and prevent them from doing so. Gillhouse is said to have no property except the mortgage covering the farm. He moved upon the property four years ago.

Claim Not Legal—Attorney General Brown has ruled in reply to an inquiry by Secretary of State Olcott, that if Alfred C. Morris is to collect from the state on a claim for \$75 damages alleged to have been caused by a fish dam, it must be by legislative action. A board of arbiters fixed the damage at \$75 and a claim was put in to collect the account from the fish and game commission. The attorney general holds that there is no authority of law to make the collection in that manner.
