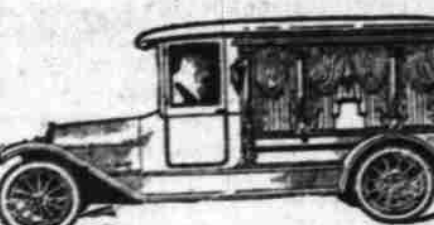

Tariffs Are Filed by C. K. Spaulding Company

The Charles K. Spaulding Logging company has filed with the public service commission a schedule of rates and rules adopted under the company's log franchise on the Luckiamute river. The rates to be charged per thousand board feet on saw logs follow:

Driving in quantities of 1,000,000 feet or more, \$1.

Driving in quantities less than 1,000,000 feet (accepted only with other deliveries making total drive of 1,000,000 feet or more), \$1.25.

Gathering up logs that hand along banks after a drive, including rolling logs within the banks of the stream, but not logs thrown outside the banks by freshets, \$1.50.

Booming and rafting, 50 cents.

Sorting (as to species only), 30 cents.

Storing per month or fraction thereof, 25 cents.
