Officers' Training Camps Accept No More Applicants

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Orders were issued today by the war department discontinuing accepting of applicants for the central officers' training corps and stopping the organization of any new classes. There are now approximately 100,000 men in training at these camps operating on a monthly class basis.

The November classes will be discontinued and a decision is expected soon as to whether the present classes shall be continued to graduation. None of the additional training camps officers that had been planned will be established.

The future of the student officers' training units in universities and other schools also is now being worked out. Secretary Baker said today that the question of the best way of stopping this work with the least disruption of the institution involved in being considered by the college officials associated with government in the work and also by the general staff. A policy will be worked out, the secretary said, that will turn the colleges back to their regular pursuits as quickly as possible without causing losses to the institutions.

Senator-elect Mulkey On Way to Washington

Fred W. Mulkey of Portland, who was elected United States senator for the short term is expected to arrive in Washington shortly where he will qualify for the office and then resign in favor of Senator McNary, so that Senator McNary may immediately be re-appointed by Governor Withycombe and continue his committee assignments without interruption. This will enable Oregon to have better representation when the new senate convenes.

SENATOR-ELECT MULKEY ON WAY TO WASHINGTON

SEATTLE, Nov. 12.—One hundred and seventy-one new cases of Spanish influenza were reported for the past three days ending tonight, with only five deaths for today. Seattle, with all health bans lifted today, is enjoying freedom without the gauze masks.

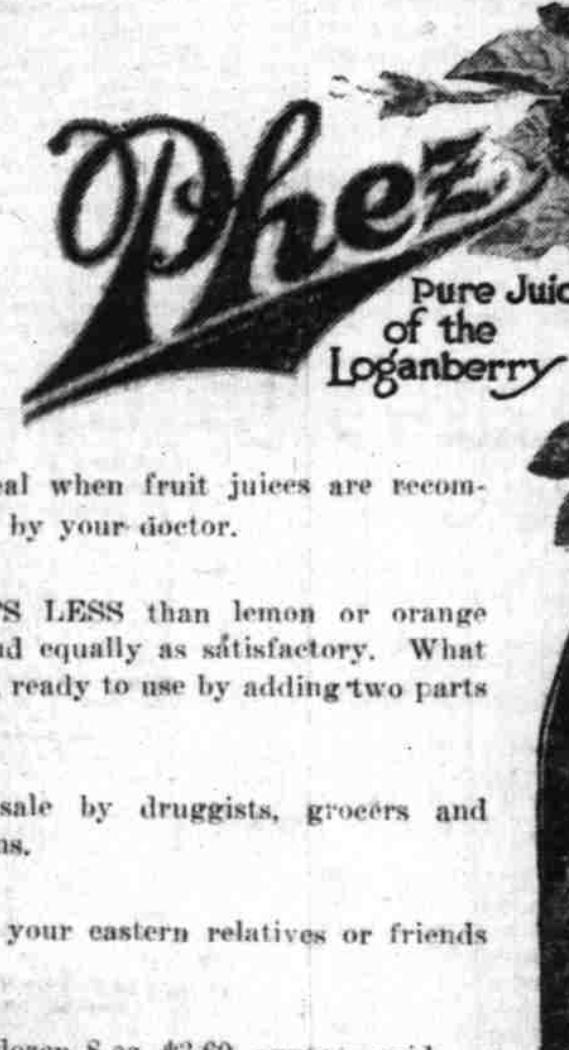

CONFERENCE ON PEACE NOT YET LOOMING NEAR

Dr. Solf's Appeal May Have to Wait on Developments in Germany

CONTROL IS UNCERTAIN

Ebert Government Now Recognized May Not Be Able to Hold Its Own

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The new note addressed to President Wilson by Dr. Solf, the German foreign secretary, asking President Wilson to arrange immediately a "preliminary peace" had not reached Washington tonight in official form. When it does come it will be considered in connection with the communication received today through the Swiss minister asking the president to intervene to mitigate the "fearful conditions" of the armistice.

Dr. Solf's object in again addressing the president, it is assumed here, is to secure an immediate peace conference for the purpose of discussing some of the terms of the armistice, which, in his first note, he said threatened starvation and ruin in Germany.

Officials are satisfied Dr. Solf is needlessly alarmed, as the terms of the armistice provide "the allies and the United States should give consideration to the provisioning of Germany during the armistice to the extent recognized as necessary." It is said to that end such rolling stock and ships as may be necessary will be put into use.

Dr. Solf's request for the hastening of a "preliminary peace" may mean the German government wishes to leave to a later time and possibly to a second peace conference the permanent settlement of the great issues involved in President Wilson's fourteen terms and the principles he has enunciated since they were laid down. Such a suggestion it is said, would be without precedent.

It was pointed out today that there are physical difficulties in hastily convening a peace conference which will include representatives of all the nations which have formally declared war on Germany. Conference limited to envoys of the allied governments and that of the United States might be held at a reasonably early date, perhaps within a month, if it is limited in scope to a few urgent issues.

"One consideration in the minds of officials related to the status of the German government itself. The president already has referred to the armistice as fluid and the course of the Russian revolutionists has emphasized, it was said, the need of caution in securing assurances of the stability of any government with which permanent peace treaties are negotiated. The American and allied governments actually have recognized the Social Democrat government at Berlin, headed by Frederick Ebert, as the de facto government of Germany by conceding its authority to authorize the armistice delegates to sign the document. But developments in Germany have caused apprehension that Russian history may be repeated there and the present government replaced by a soldiers' or workmen's council or committee, which could not be recognized by the allies or the United States because it would be essentially a class government.

Stenay Taken by Yanks In Last Hour of Fight

(By The Associated Press)
WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES N THE SEDAN FRONT, Monday, Nov. 11.—(7:30 p. m.)—Stenay, on the right bank of the River Meuse, was included in the territory held by the American troops in the last hours of the offensive.

Knowing that a hundred civilians were in the place no serious effort had been made to take the town earlier as it would have required a bombardment. When the operations began early in the day, the American line skirted a little wood at one corner of the town and was within six hundred yards of it at another. In those places advanced patrols had been stationed.

It was not a solid line and while shells of all caliber shrieked from the American batteries over the town into the German lines and on the positions in the rear it was not known whether the district had been evacuated. Two correspondents of The Associated Press rode beyond the fixed positions on the front line along an excellent road, passed the patrol and reached the city.

The Germans had gone. The civilians were yet in hiding. The streets were wholly deserted. The correspondents were the first to enter the place since it had been occupied by the Germans.

A few minutes later patrols moved up from other positions and shortly before 11 o'clock American sentries were posted at the entrances to the town on the opposite side.

MINNESOTA STAYS WET.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 12.—The unofficial majority for the state prohibition amendment melted away tonight with the receipt of official returns from 59 counties. It was estimated Minnesota probably would remain wet by a margin of a few hundred votes.

TRUST COMPANY TO HAVE RIGHT

Portland Firm Will Meet Requirements for Purchase of "Acceptances"

If the Lumbermen's Trust company of Portland meets certain requirements it has a lawful right to purchase without limitation the so-called "bankers' acceptances" as defined by the federal reserve board regulations. This is the ruling of Attorney General Brown in response to a question submitted by Will H. Bennett, superintendent of banks, involving the authority of the Lumbermen's Trust company to purchase under the Oregon statutes what is known as "bankers' acceptances."

The company already has in deposit with the superintendent of banks \$50,000 in securities and has agreed to meet the requirements by depositing another \$50,000 and filing the resolution referred to in the opinion.

Mr. Bennett's request is accompanied by a letter from John Keating, president of the trust company, in which Mr. Keating says that his company desires to purchase a block of United States Grain corporation drafts, secured by warehouse receipts to be accepted by the trust company and offered for sale either at the federal reserve bank or to the company's clientele. Heretofore this business has been handled by the national banks of Portland.

Mr. Keating points out that the federal reserve bank recently has ruled that the grain corporation drafts are "domestic," and therefore under federal reserve bank regulations, bank members of the federal reserve system cannot accept them to an amount in excess of 50 per cent of their capital and surplus.

Mr. Keating says that the manager of the federal reserve bank has called the trust company's attention to the fact that as a non-member trust company it can, under the regulations, accept them to an unlimited amount. "It is therefore clear," he concludes, "that we can step in and take care of a large part of the overflow. As a trust company we are fully authorized to make acceptances. The question then arises as to the extent to which we can do so."

In his opinion Attorney General Brown construes section 29 (a), chapter 197, laws of 1917, section 14 of this act provides for a deposit with the superintendent of banks as security and as a pledge for the faithful performance of its duties of a trust company as specified in the act, or a like amount in interest-bearing securities, and defines the kind and character of such securities. There is a proviso that the restrictions contained in section 22 shall not apply to any trust company having a capital of \$500,000 or more, which does not receive deposits and which has filed with the superintendent of banks a resolution of its governing board expressly stating that it will not receive deposits with the superintendent of banks the sum of \$100,000 cash, or interest-bearing securities of the nature and character prescribed by sub-division (a) of section 14 of the trust act.

"I advise you," the opinion finishes, "that if the Lumbermen's Trust company has filed such a resolution with you as superintendent of banks, and shall have deposited with you such a sum of money, or interest-bearing securities as specified in the trust law, then the Lumbermen's Trust company has a lawful right to purchase the so-called 'bankers' acceptances' without limitation as to the amount."

JUSTICE MUST GO TO PRISON

Supreme Court Upholds Verdict Brought in Lower Court for Coos

A. E. Shuster, former justice of the peace of North Bend, Coos county, faces a penalty of imprisonment of from one to 15 years in the state penitentiary and a fine of more than \$1200 as the result of an opinion of the state supreme court yesterday which was written by Justice Olson. Judge John S. Coke presided in the lower court. The charge against Shuster was embezzlement by a public official. It was alleged that, as justice of the peace, he collected fees over a considerable length of time totalling more than \$600, and did not turn the money over to the county treasurer. The law provides that in a trial court in cases of this character the jury's verdict must state the amount of the alleged embezzlement. An appeal was taken on the ground that the verdict failed to do this, but the opinion points out that the verdict held that the defendant was guilty "as charged in the indictment." The appeal was served as a stay of execution and Shuster, though sentenced, has not been confined in the state prison pending the decision of the supreme court. The penalty provided by law is imprisonment of from one to 15 years and a fine of twice the amount of embezzlement.

Americans Blast, Hun Thinks Its Firing and Begs Yanks to Quit

(By The Associated Press)

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES ON THE MEUSE, Nov. 12.—(6:30 p. m.)—Blasting by American engineers in a road repairing detachment caused the German high command to send a message to the allied high command Monday afternoon contending that the Americans had not ceased hostilities on November 11.

The message sent by wireless to the allied high command was timed 2 p. m. and read:

"On the front of Stenay-Beaumont along the Meuse, Americans continue despite conclusion of armistice. Please order stopping of hostilities." The American answer to the German message read as follows:

"Received your radio. Orders have been given for the American activities signalled on the Stenay-Beaumont front cease immediately."

So the engineers did not blast during the remainder of Monday afternoon. Early this morning, however, they resumed their blasting.
