Reversal Hits Stocks With Department Ruling

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 .- The stock market today gave further expression to the many conflicting factors which have engaged the earnest attention of financial and industrial interests since the signing of the

armistice. Prices were firm to strong at the beginning, rails, shippings, equipments and oils, together with such specialties as motors and tobaccos holding their gains of one to three points throughout the forenoon.

Later the entire list fell back, the reversal coinciding with reports from Washington that the war industries board had been empowered to cancel war contracts in excess of comparatively nominal amounts.

Sales amounted to 615,000 shares Liberty bonds eased slightly, domestic railway and industrial issues yielded 1 to 11/2 per cent, and internationals were irregular. sales, par value, aggregated \$11. 775,000. Old United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Gillespie shell loading plant at Morgan, which cost nearly 100 lives, was the work of an enemy agent was voiced at the senate investigation of the tragedy here today by Hugh A. Leonard, superinendent of the unit in which the ex-

plosion occurred Leonard admitted he had no reaen to suspect any particular employe of the plant, but declared he had nade a careful inspection of the unit hortly before the disaster, and was convinced that the explosion could not have been accidental.

Yates, vice-president and general manager of the Gillespie company. was permitted to testify publicly that on the day of the explosion there had is given 840 men at one time and been beween 25,000,000 and 30,000,-000 pounds of t. n. t., nitrate of ammonia, loaded shells and smokeless two weeks of intensive training. powder at the plant.
