To Release Yank After 3 Years in German Prison

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 20.—A Berlin dispatch dated Saturday, says Edward Hilton James, an American lawyer, once editor of the Paris Liberator, has been released from the military prison at Mosab, after more than three years imprisonment on a charge of carrying on anti-monarchical propaganda in connection with Dr. Karl Liebknecht. The dispatch adds that Mr. James appears to be none the worse for his confinement and that he is returning to the United States.

Edward James Hilton was born at Prairie du Chien, Wis., and graduated from Harvard in 1896. After practicing law in Seattle he left for Paris in 1906 and a few years later came into national prominence through his association with Edward F. Myles, a Belgian, in the publication of the Paris Liberator.

were ready to receive them. The children tossed flowers at the soldiers as they passed through the streets. The Esch band which had been called to assemble in a o'clock. For three days the civilians to the city hall, where the mayor and officials received the military officers. After mid-day even the mines closed, in order to give the workers, many of them women and girls, an opportunity for assembling in the square, where formal ceremonies were held.

AMERICAN ARMY OF OCCUPATION, Nov. 20.—(By The Associated Press.)—The Americans had another triumphal day today in the forward march of the army of occupation. Crossing the old German frontier of 1914 into Lorraine and swinging northward into grand duchy of Luxembourg the Americans were received enthusiastically everywhere. On the left American marines occupied the town of Arlon, Belgium, where the day has been proclaimed a holiday. Thousands of civilians greeted the Americans, who entered Arlon early in the morning. To the south the Americans went into Fontoy and Vitry in Lorraine and several villages to the northeast of Vitry.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 20.—A continuous procession of German troops is passing through Limburg, homeward bound, according to the Handelsblat. At least 150,000 will cross the border near Roosteren, where they will be disarmed by the Dutch. Good order is prevailing by direction of the officers. (By The Associated Press) METZ, Tuesday, Nov. 19.—The historic event accomplished at 2 o'clock this afternoon when Marshal Petain, commander-in-chief of the French armies, made his entry into Metz, the great stronghold of Lorraine and the pivot of Germany's ef-

fort to crush France, may be said more than any other happening to consecrate the victory of the allies in this war.

People unaccustomed to any tongue other than German for years began many days ago brushing up their knowledge of French in preparation for this occasion and although the majority of the population undoubtedly has a perfect acquaintance in no other tongue than the German, little of that language was heard in the streets today.

Other German things had disappeared overnight, including the statues of the German rulers, which had been hauled down by the citizens.

The people of Metz, the majority being Roman Catholics, know Latin if they are not strong on French. They crowded around the cathedral all morning to witness the transformation of the statues. Meanwhile the statues of the French heroes Ney and Fabert (Abraham De Fabert), marshal of France in 1865) were beheaded with flowers and bunting. French military engravings appeared as if by magic in the windows of art stores and an oil painting of Napoleon was hung out from a conspicuous window, where it would be in full view of the incoming heroes.

Preparations for the reception of Marshal Petain were made Sunday evening at the first public meeting in 48 years at which the people of Lorraine could meet freely and converse in French without running the risk of being sent to prison. All classes of citizens participated, including the newly returned exiles and excluding only that element of the population descending from immigrants. All were out early this morning in long processions along the line of entry of the French troops which were approaching the town in three columns along the Moselle to unite at Montigny.
