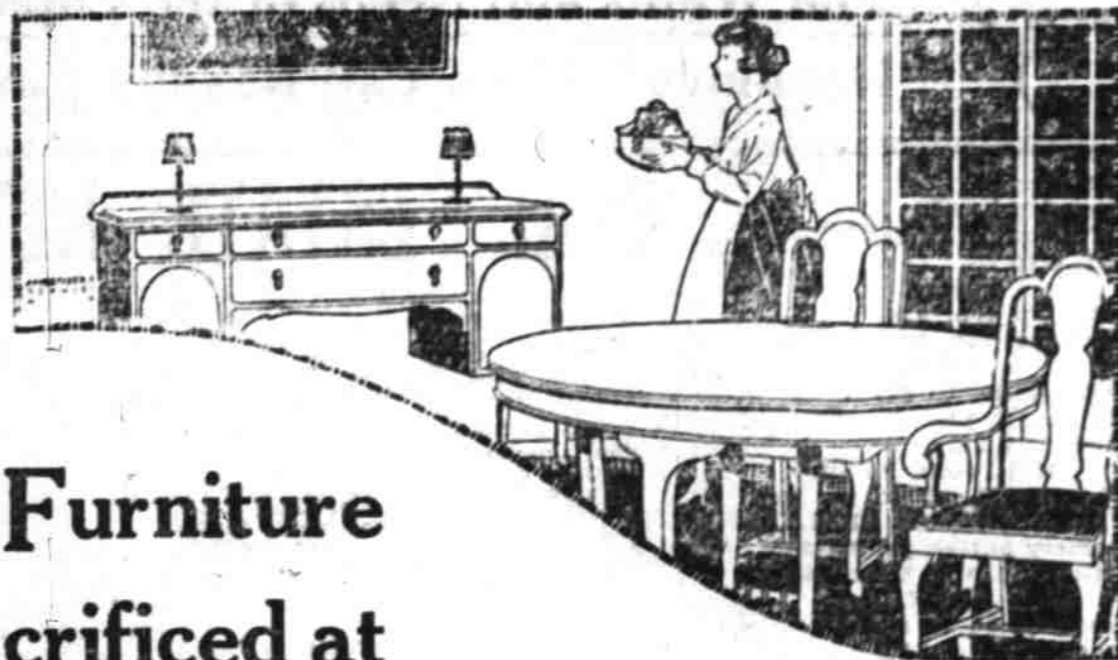

BOLSHEVIK IS DOWNED BY THE UKRAINIAN MEN

Cossack Troops Friendly to All-Russian Government Have High Hand

MOVE OF IMPORTANCE

Opens Way, It Is Believed for Great Developments in Stricken Land

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Overthrow of the Bolsheviki regime in the Ukraine and the capture of Kiev by Cossack troops friendly to the all-Russian government, as reported today from Copenhagen, opens the way in the opinion of officials here, for important developments in Russia. While no change in policy, either political or military, has been made by the United States, it is realized that the holding of the Ukraine by forces friendly to the associated governments and decidedly hostile to the Bolsheviki opens a path directly into the heart of Russia either for the dispatch of troops or of supplies for the relief of the demoralized civilian population.

Recent reports from London have been taken by some observers here to indicate that Great Britain may propose the sending of additional troops into Russia to place the country on a stable footing and eliminate the Bolsheviki. It was said today, however, that no definite word as to this has been received here. Possibilities that the Bolsheviki leaders may flee Russia after accumulating large amounts of loot have been touched upon in recent dispatches, but have been discounted here, largely because no haven for them appears available. Switzerland has ejected their representatives forcibly, Holland has declared they are not wanted there, and even Germany now is not expected to tolerate them within its borders.

The Bolsheviki fighting strength is considered as virtually now concentrated against the allied and Russian troops operating south from Archangel. The unusual lateness of the winter in that region has aided the Bolshevists, as in the ice-free streams they have been able to utilize armed river boats against the allied and United States forces. Although compelled to operate almost altogether on land, the troops of the associated governments have been able to withstand all attacks. Despite the resistance they are offering in the north, it is believed in some quarters here that the strength of the Bolsheviki is waning. With the Cossacks holding the Ukraine, with the military and political forces of the Omsk government working west and with the American and allied forces pushing south, some officials consider that the position of the disturber of Russian peace has become serious. However, no immediate collapse of the Bolsheviki regime is believed imminent.

Bonds Arrive, But They Are Without Signatures

Bonds of the Squay Creek Irrigation district of Deschutes county, amounting to \$98,000, were received at the office of State Engineer Percy A. Capper yesterday from the printer to be turned over to the secretary of state to be certified. The bonds, however, are without the signatures of the district officials and it was necessary to send them back to Bend to be signed. The bonds were approved by the irrigation securities commission some time ago. The regular semi-annual meeting of the state water board met yesterday, but only routine business came before the board for consideration.

\$158,565,058 Is Reported For Nation in Campaign

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Officials of the united war work campaign announced tonight that the national total for the drive to drive for \$170,500,000 which was at midnight tonight was \$158,565,058. They added, however, that this report was incomplete and figures would not be available for at least two days. Leaders of the patriotic drive of the seven welfare organizations remained hopeful of attaining the goal, asserting that the state local committees in all parts of the country were too busy tabulating last minute contributions to report. George W. Perkins, chairman of the finance department of the campaign, issued a statement in which he asserted that "it is impossible to give anything like accurate figures as the campaign draws to a close." "As quickly as the figures are in a statement showing the amount secured in each state the union will be made public," he said. "Scratching returns today are satisfactory, but New York city, Philadelphia, Minneapolis, St. Louis and a large number of cities have not had their final meetings."

Old Carlisle Athlete Is Nabbed as a Bootlegger

OMAHA, Nov. 20.—John M. Deer, former Carlisle athlete, was brought to Omaha today from Winnieago reservation, by federal officials. He had been convicted several months ago and although wealthy, refused to pay his \$100, and was again taken into custody. The federal officials have stated what action will be taken.
