"Reconstruction work will tax the productive capacity of the country for lumber and other materials for years," said Edwin B. Parker, commissioner of priorities for the War Industries Board, in Chicago yesterday, speaking to the National Lumber Association in convention there.

He said he understood construction permits for new work in New York soon would total \$200,000,000.

He said the export trade in the lumber business was to be a big thing in the future, and that a long period of prosperity was ahead for the farmers and the whole country.

is here. His absence from the country, his departure upon a voyage to the place of the conference would be an occasion of serious concern to the people. Decisions of moment will have to be taken during the coming months by the legislative and executive departments of the government. The people would not like, even for a few months, to be deprived of the guidance of the chief magistrate at a time when his unequalled knowledge of the state of the nation, concerning which it is his duty to advise congress, his understanding of the feeling and wishes of the people, his great authority, will be of peculiar value.

Great as the occasion will be, it does not seem to us that the peace conference will call for the attendance of the president of the United States. He is expected to send delegates, not to go himself. However frequently it may be pointed out, here and abroad, that he is our prime minister, he is much more than that. In fact and in title he is the actual head of the state. There will be no member of that conference whom, in formal communications of amity and good will, he would address as "great and good friend." The people of the United States will not be able to dismiss from their minds the feeling that there would be something of unseemliness in his taking part in a council where questions will be argued, positions be attacked and defended, differences of opinion "thrashed out," as the saying goes. That is the function of delegates speaking as representatives of their governments. We are accustomed to feel that when the president speaks he speaks with authority. It is not quite the thing that he should engage in argument, much less in such controversies as will naturally arise in the discussion by the conference of the multitude of questions it must decide. If the president is not to take part in the deliberations, but is to attend as a distinguished visitor, the country would feel that it is not worth while. It is probable that the president will incline to that view.
