CUPPER TELLS OF POLICY TO BE FOLLOWED

Relations of Public and Individual to Be Guarded by Official

LONG WITH DEPARTMENT

Appointee Is Native of Oregon and Graduate of Oregon Schools

The policy of State Engineer Percy A. Cupper, who has been appointed to succeed John H. Lewis, will be to cultivate the present tendency towards a closer relation with the water users of the state so that the interests of the public as well as the individual water user may be served. Mr. Cupper so declared yesterday upon receiving from Governor Withycombe the certificate of appointment, formally making him state engineer.

Mr. Cupper has been in the office of state engineer since 1905, his first employment in the department being on the Walla Walla river survey in Umatilla county. Subsequently he spent a short time in private work, but returned to the state department. Prior to 1905 he was with the United States reclamation service.

Mr. Cupper was born at Heppner, Morrow county, in 1882. He graduated from Bishop Scott academy, Portland, in 1901 and from Oregon Agricultural college in 1904. While serving as state engineer he took the law course at Willamette university, was graduated and admitted to the bar in 1910.

Upon receiving his certificate of appointment yesterday Engineer Cupper gave out the following statement: "It seems probable that we are on the eve of the great development of our national resources throughout the entire nation. Undoubtedly the federal government will adopt a comprehensive program, including the construction of irrigation, drainage and power projects and the reclamation of logged-off lands.

"One of the problems of the state of Oregon in this connection is to foresee what form the national development program will take and then adjust conditions in this state, through legislation and otherwise to place it in a position to receive the benefits from this national program of development. Not that all development will be done by the national government, but the government's program will influence to a very

large extent the development by other agencies. Oregon is particularly fortunate in having had a thorough investigation made of her many important irrigation projects in cooperation with the federal government which investigation now forms an excellent basis for further cooperation and also in that Oregon has what is probably the best irrigation district law in the United States. The good effect of this statute has been shown in the past 18 months in the sale of more than \$2,000,000 of Oregon district bonds, while for several years previous no irrigation securities at all were disposed of.

"It will be the policy of this office to cultivate a closer relation with the water users of the state to the end that the public interest as well as the interest of the individual water user may best be served.

"The time seems particularly opportune to combine the duties of the superintendent of water division No. 1 with those of the state engineer as the water rights on many of the important streams in this division have been adjusted and the work can doubtless now be handled more economically by one official, thus saving the state the salary of the superintendent of water division No. 1 at this time when economy in all lines is so essential.

"In taking up the work where Mr. Lewis laid it down after 14 years of successful administration, I realize that I have a large order to fill, particularly as the near future promises to be an era of important development of our water resources."

Gains Are Shown by 24 Banks in City of Portland

On the basis of the call of November 1, a statement issued by the state banking department shows for the 24 banks and trust companies of Portland a net gain in resources of \$36,381,484.82 over the call of November 20, 1917, and a net gain of \$27,502,363.86 over the call of August 31, 1918. The total of resources shown on the call of November 1, this year, is \$157,677,900.41. The total of deposits shown with 24 Portland institutions is \$125,884,709.85, a gain since August 31, this year of \$19,588,212.64.
